

SENATORS KEEP LEAD WITHOUT MUCH TROUBLE

Have Four Game Lead With No Let-up Of Furious Pace

While their highly touted brethren falter and stumble, the Washington Senators proceed blithely on their victorious way in the American League much as the St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Robins, "dark horses" both, are doing in the National.

Picked in advance predictions to finish no higher than seventh, the Senators, under great leadership by Walter Johnson, were leading the pack by four full games today and giving no signs of cracking under the amazing pace they have set.

Take 15 Out of 19

Yesterday they scored their sixth successive victory and their 15th in 19 games, beating the New York Yankees, 10 to 7, stealing a lead from the Yanks' own book, the Senators won on home runs. Joe Judge and Goose Goslin hit successive home runs in the fourth and repeated the feat in the fifth, thus accounting for six runs. The second blast from the Washington batmen was the high spot of a seven-run rally that swept Vernon Gemes off the mound and won the ball game.

Cleveland in Third

Cleveland bounced back into third place with a double victory over the Chicago White Sox, 7 to 3 and 5 to 2. Wes Ferrell outdistanced Red Faber by a wide margin in the opener and Clint Brown had an edge on Cecil Caraway in the nightcap.

Lefty Grove chalked up his sixth win without a defeat as the Athletics beat Boston 5 to 3. Grove had only one bad inning, the eighth, when the Red Sox bunched hits for four runs.

The Detroit Tigers made good use of eight hits to beat St. Louis, 7 to 2, and moved into sixth place while the Browns fell back to seventh.

Cards Still Lead

In the National League, Brooklyn and St. Louis each recorded victories to keep the Cardinals on top of the league standings by half a game.

The Dodgers gave their metropolitan rivals, the New York Giants, their fifth straight defeat, 7 to 0, as Ed Barry of the turned in his best effort of the year. Vance gave the Giants only two hits, one a scratch, and permitted only two men to get as far as second base.

The Cardinals turned back Pittsburgh, 10-4, for their eighth straight win and their 17 in 18 games. The Cards shelled Jess Petty off the mound with a four run rally in the fourth while Lindser, relieving Sherdel in the sixth, was a puzzle to the Corsairs.

Despite Hack Wilson's 13th homer of the year with one on, "Inclanati" beat the Cubs, 6 to 2. Jackie May gave the Cubs only six hits.

Base Running; The Hook Slide

Base running is one of the most important parts of baseball. Many a game is lost by stupid work on the paths, that otherwise would have been an easy victory.

Although speed is a big factor, good headwork and skill play a big part in the success of a good base runner. Getting the "jump" on the pitcher counts for much. More bases are stolen off the pitcher than the catcher. Study the opposing pitchers for little mannerisms that betray their intention to throw to the plate and then get your start.

Some base runners used a head first slide, which is simply a headlong dive, with the arms outstretched. It is useful in getting back to a base.

The standard slide, however, is the "hook" slide. Leap for the bag feet foremost and as you hit the ground swing your right leg around, bringing your body with it and hook the corner of the bag with your left foot.

When using this slide be sure you wear sliding pads to protect your hips or otherwise you will receive some painful skins and bruises.

These are called "sliders" and "strawberries" by the professional players and are things to be avoided.

Willing and Moe Drop From Race

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 27. (AP)—Two members of the American Walker Cup team, Dr. O. F. Willing and Donald K. Moe, both of Portland, Ore., were eliminated in the second round of the British Amateur golf championship this morning. Two other Walker Cup players, Francis Guimet and George Von Elm, advanced to the third round after comparatively easy matches, while a third, Roland MacKenzie, advanced without playing when his scheduled opponent scratched his entry.

Dr. Willing was removed from the competition early in the day by William Spark, a Scot, two up and one to play, and Moe fell before Rex Hartley, brilliant young English player, four up and two to play.

Guimet won from a fellow Bostonian, Joshua Crane, five up and four to play, and Von Elm stopped Dr. Gardiner Hill, St. Andrews, four up and two to play.

Other Americans to advance today were J. B. Gwaltney, New York, and Walter G. Povargue, Aberdeen, Wash., the latter by default.

Other Americans defeated included Howard C. Davis, Salem, Mass., and Eric H. Chambers, Portland, Ore.

Frank C. Stevens Jr., Hollywood, Calif., won a third round match from F. P. McConnell, Portrush, five up and four to play.

George Volght, New York, won his way into the fourth round of the championship by defeating J. R. A. Stoyan, Sunningdale, six up and four to play.

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TOURNAMENT EUGENE DRAWS MANY GOLFERS

More Than 125 Players Turn Out for 36-Hole Qualifying Round

EUGENE, Ore., May 27. (AP)—The Oregon State amateur golf championship tournament, now in progress here, has drawn representatives from four times as many golf clubs this year as ever before. The entry list totals 175 and includes all of the state's best golfers with the exception of Don Moe, Dr. O. F. Willing, and H. Chandler Egan.

More than 125 men today are playing their 36-hole qualifying rounds. Par for the 18-hole course is 72 and officers and members of the Eugene country club, where the tournament play is taking place, are wagering that no card better than 144 will be turned in during the qualifying rounds.

Miss Scott Wins

Miss Frances Scott drove her way through a field of 42 women yesterday with an 88 in the 18-hole medal round. The young Waverly country club star led her nearest competitor, Miss Jean Plageman, Multnomah club, by only one stroke. Mrs. Edmund Shek, Columbia country club, was third with an 89.

Miss Scott's medal winning round was four over women's par for the course but with a few exceptions she played sound golf. Her game from the tee and through the fairway was good and while other players strayed into the rough, Miss Scott kept to the fairway. She used three strokes over par going out but came back in 40, only one over par. Miss Plageman was out in 45 and home in 42 and only a long putt which she failed to hole on the 18th green kept her from tying Miss Scott for medalist prize.

American Women Golfers Defeat Women of France

(AP)—American women golfers defeated a team of French women today 10½ to 4½, the visitors, led by Glenna Collett, winning three foursomes, seven singles and halving one singles match. The French women, captained by Simone Thion De La Chaume, won two foursomes, two singles and scored one half in singles.

The most interesting match was waged between the rival captains, Miss Collett defeating Mlle. Thion De La Chaume two up after a battle continuing to the home green.

The French captain, however, with Moe, A. M. Vagliano as her partner, defeated Miss Collett and Miss Bernice Wall in the foursomes, two up, the same score by which the singles match between the two companions was later decided.
