Klamath County Chamber of Commerce Adopts Program of Work for Fiscal Year 1930-31

The following program of work for the fiscal year 1930-1931 for the Klamath county chamber of commerce was submitted to the board of directors at the Tuesday luncheon and, with a few minor changes, accepted:

To the Board of Directors: The program of work committee submits the following projects for your approval for the year 1930-31. These may be briefly grouped into five major and five minor projects.

Major Projects
Agriculture and land settlement.
Aviation.
Civic improvement.
Roads and highways.
Tourist travel.

Minor Projects
Establishment of a U. S. Veterans' hospital.
Manufacturing and wholesale distribution.
Permanent home for the chamber of commerce.
Railroad expansion.
Study organization of community chest.

The distinction was made between the major and minor projects not alone on their merit but due consideration was given to the possibility of completing certain projects during the coming year. The various projects were subdivided as follows:

Agriculture and Land Settlement
To aid in the increased production and better marketing of agricultural products.
Encourage the utilization of our unoccupied farming lands by giving authentic agricultural information.

Aviation
To complete municipal airport and provide for the maintenance in an up-to-date manner.

Civic Improvement
Investigate water system and water rates for the city of Klamath Falls.
Establishment of an armory.
Encourage the planting of trees.

Roads and Highways
Continue expansion and betterment of state and county roads in Klamath county.
Completion of the Weed-Klamath highway.
Completion of the Dallas-Callifornia highway.
Preservation of scenic attractions.

paying particular attention to the exchange of privately-owned timber adjacent to highways for that of publicly-owned timber remote from highways. Establishment of a state park at the head of Wood river valley. Establishment of a U. S. Veterans' Hospital.

Assist local veterans' organization to secure a hospital for veterans by obtaining data. **Manufacturing and Wholesale Distribution** Utilization of waste products. Study paper box manufacturing.

Establishment of new manufacturing plants in lines not now represented. Secure freight rates which will enable Klamath Falls to become a larger jobbing center. Permanent home for chamber of commerce.

Railroad Expansion Encourage the expansion of railroads into territory adjacent to Klamath Falls. Advertise transportation facilities of Klamath county with the view of securing businesses which are dependent upon adequate railroad transportation. Study organization of community chest.
