SOFT-HEARTED OTTO REGAINS RING STANDING

Battles Jack Gagnon To Canvas After Six Hard Rounds

CHICAGO, May 29. (AP)—Otto Von Porat, long ridiculed as a fighting man without a real fighting heart, has bounded back as one of the outstanding candidates for the heavyweight boxing championship.

The angular Norwegian regained his standing and completely belied his soft-hearted reputation at the Chicago stadium last night by battering Jack Gagnon, knockout conqueror of Tuffy Griffith, in the canvas after six slashing rounds.

Most Impressive Kayo
The knockout victory was perhaps the most impressive turned in by Von Porat since his invasion of America. Aiming heavy right hand smashes skillfully at his fast moving target, the big Norseman was as relentless in his attack as he had been merciful in previous fights. Six times he felled the Boston gob before he put him down and out for the count. The more courageous Gagnon became in the face of the heavy attack, the more furious became the barrage of punches.

Hold Weight Advantage
Outweighing his rival 17 1/4 pounds, Von Porat sparred leisurely during the first round, he floored Gagnon for counts of eight and nine with terrific punches to the head and body. He repeated his knockdowns, once in the third and three times in the sixth before he finally finished his opponent.

Von Porat's impressive victory probably has a 1-2-4 whatever chances he had of getting a match with Griffith, a match that probably would draw a large indoor or outdoor crowd, but it also placed him in line for bigger game. The stadium matchmaker is now seeking a bout for him with the winner of the Jack Sharkey-Max Schmeling fight for the heavyweight crown.

Coen Eliminated In Championships On French Courts

AUTEUIL, France, May 29. (AP)—Wilbur Coen, eighth ranking American tennis player, was eliminated in the fourth round of the French hard court championships today by Baron Humbert De Morpurgo, Italian veteran, in straight sets. The scores were 6-3, 6-4, 6-1.

The Kansas City youngster's defeat left Bill Tilden as the only American standing in the men's singles where Morpurgo's victory carried him into the quarter final round.

Fully 7,000 spectators, the largest attendance of the week were on hand for the match. Elizabeth Ryan, native Californian and residing in England, defeated Yvette Barbiere of France, 6-1, 6-2, to reach the quarter finals. Miss Ryan played magnificent tennis and considered likely to reach the semi-finals where she probably would meet her doubles partner, Helen Wills Moody.

Western Track Squads Rated As Winners in Harvard Meet

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 29. (AP)—If at least three world records are not buffeted about in the intercollegiate A. A. A. championships starting tomorrow in the Harvard stadium, it will not be because of any lack of rivalry between the two squads of strong-armed and swift-legged youth from Stanford and Southern California.

The expected battle between the two Pacific coast universities for the team championships in this track and field classic, now 54 years old, likely will see the 100-yard, shotput and discus tossing records subjected to the severest and low hurdles also may be topped, if the boys are in top form and the conditions favorable.

Frank Wycoff, who has done the century in 9.4 on the coast without starting blocks, is concentrating all his efforts in this event, in which his main rivals will be Eddie Toland of Michigan, the new world's record holder at 9.5, and Hec Dyer, the Stanford star, who beat Wycoff in 9.6 at Los Angeles. Three Americans Stay in British Championship Race

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 29. (AP)—Only three Americans remained in the British amateur golf championship after the fifth round which brought defeat to George Von Elm and Francis O'Neil, and only two can survive the sixth as the luck of the draw arrayed Bobby Jones against Jimmy Johnston in an afternoon match. George Voigt was the third American to enter the sixth round.

Jones, Johnston and Voigt all won with comparative ease in the morning. Jones defeated G. O. Watt seven up and six to play. Johnston stopped D. C. Murray, five and three while Voigt turned back William Campbell, four and two.

Von Elm was defeated by the 52 year old Hon. Michael Scott, scion of a famous British golfing and banking family in a stirring 20 hole match in which the Detroit came from behind to square the match, only to lose later.

In the afternoon matches Voigt played W. L. Hope while Jones and Johnston, open and amateur champions of the United States were in a clash, just behind.

HARRY SEIBOLD AMAZES WITH PERFORMANCE

The current performance of Harry Seibold, veteran pitcher of the Boston Braves, is one of the most amazing things in the National League struggle.

Back in the days when Washington had a pair of pitchers named Nick Altrock and Al Schacht and a young left handed hurler appeared on the Boston Red Sox roster as G. Ruth and was considered a good enough batsman to appear in a world series game as a pinch hitter, Seibold was a regular hurler with the Philadelphia Athletics.

Went to Minors
A decade ago Seibold disappeared into the minor leagues and little more was heard of him until he appeared at the top of the International League list with Reading in 1928. The Chicago Cubs called him in from their farm to use as trading material and sent him to the Braves. Seibold had a fair season last year, winning 12 games and losing 17, but it was not until the start of the 1930 race that he really began stepping out.

So far in a race only two months old, Seibold has pitched nine complete games and has won seven of them. He has not yet been removed from the hill. Taking his complete turn every five or six days with a remarkable degree of success in a close race. He had the Phillies to six hits yesterday and won his seventh victory by a 5 to 1 score in the first game the teams have been able to play this week.

Stewart Leading Rival
Seibold's leading rival for staying honors in the Major League, Walter Stewart of the St. Louis Browns, trailed right along behind yesterday, completing his eighth contest in ten games with a 4 to 2 victory over the Detroit Tigers. Stewart also has won seven games but has been defeated three times.

The Chicago Cubs moved up to an almost safe place in the National League's first division by winning the remaining contest of the three which survived the rain and cold of yesterday. By defeating the Cincinnati Reds, 6 to 5, the Cubs made their margin over the New York Giants a full game.

JONES DEFEATS BRITISH CHAMP
