DIAMOND LAKE ROAD FREE OF SNOW AND OPEN

Matt Ryckman Returns From Inspection Of State Hatcheries

The road to Diamond Lake, in Central Oregon is open and free of snow, according to Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries who has returned from a tour which took him to all of the hatcheries and egg taking stations in that section of the state east of the Cascades. Diamond Lake, a favorite resort for hundreds of residents and non-residents anglers will be open for fishing June 1. While on his tour Mr. Ryckman paid close attention to the work going on in the hatcheries and states that the crews under his direction are obtaining all the eggs the hatcheries are in a position to handle.

Cougar Contest Closing

June 1 marks the close of the cougar killing contest which was inaugurated a year ago by the state game commission. At that time the office of Harold Clifford, state game warden will make a check of the bounties paid during the twelve month period and award cash prizes amounting to \$500 to the five leaders among the cougar hunters. This contest according to Mr. Clifford, has undoubtedly accounted for the slaying of a large number of the big cats as hunters have been anxious to be termed the "cougar champion" of Oregon as well as receive a sizable sum of money in addition to their regular \$25 bounties.

New "Fish Pullman"

After having been in service for several years and covering more than 75,000 miles in its duties of planting fry the old "Fish Pullman" of the hatchery department of the state game commission is being turned in and replaced by a new truck which will be known as "Fish Pullman II." The new truck, like its predecessor, will be capable of carrying 15,000 six inch trout under ordinary conditions and when equipped with oxygen tanks will accommodate double that number.

License Sale Slow

Sale of angling licenses by the state game commission is progressing rapidly so far as residents are concerned. Non-residents have been slow purchasers so far due to the bad weather which has held back tourists. These will come as the weather improves.

Anglers' Excursion Success

The annual fishermen's excursion over the S. P. & S. and Oregon Trunk railroads, from Portland to South Junction on the Deschutes river turned more than one hundred anglers last Saturday and Sunday. Weather conditions in Central Oregon were good and the river sufficiently clear to provide good catches for most of those who visited the famous fishing stream.

New Pacific Mail Route Favored by P. O. Department

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29. (A. P.)—E. R. White, director of international postal service, who arrived here last night for a conference with postal authorities, said today the post office department is favorably toward placing a trans-Pacific mail contract with the line of fast combination passenger and cargo ships proposed by Charles E. Dant and Kenneth D. Dawson, prominent Pacific coast lumbermen and shippers.

White said that although he did not come here to confer with Dawson, who recently returned from New York and Washington, he indicated he probably would call on Dawson.

June 26 has been fixed as the date for the opening of the bids to carry mail over the Portland-Orient route, White said.

Eighty-Six Students Get High School Diplomas

Some of the best and truest words of wisdom, and incidental advice given by one of the most famous psychologists, composed the underlying thought in the address given last night by Dean J. B. Jewell of Oregon State college when he appeared on the stage with the 1930 graduating class of Klamath high school.

"Pick out that thing that you would rather do than play; do it better than any other; then you will be one of God's own," was the frame-work of Dean Jewell's talk, "The Elements of Success."

In referring to this modern generation, the dean stated that the "flaming youth" propaganda which is broadcast worried him not at all, but it was the terrible thing called Americanitis—that method of just doing enough to get by—which made him shudder.

The talk given by the dean was informal, witty, and filled with human interest, and one of the best commencement addresses ever heard here. There were no dreary thoughts or heavy phrases to detract from the thrill which the 86 graduates on the auditorium platform were experiencing.

AT THE PINE TREE

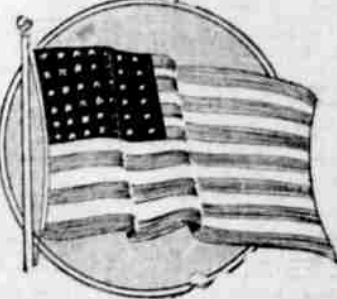
