

28TH INFANTRY TOOK CANTIGNY 12 YEARS AGO

First American Attack Carried Out May 28, 1918

The 28th Infantry (1st division), accomplished the first American offensive, its famous assault on Cantigny, with signal success, the morning of May 28, 1918, 12 years ago.

It was one of the most important actions, psychologically, in history. As the first American offensive, it raised the morale of the allies, inspired confidence in our troops, and had a depressing effect on the enemy. The men of the 28th were conscious that their success or failure in this action would greatly influence the course of the war, and they performed superbly.

5,000,000 Pounds of Steel
At 5:45 a. m. the morning of the 28th, one hundred and thirty-two 75's, thirty-six 155's, one hundred and seventy-eight heavy guns and howitzers and forty trench mortars, a total of three hundred and eighty-six guns, dumped 5,000,000 shells on the German positions in Cantigny. This preparation kept the Germans dodging more than five million pounds of steel.

The gigantic task of loading this great mass of ammunition at the dumps and transporting and delivering it to the battery positions throughout the sector was accomplished during the night by the 1st Ammunition Train.

The 28th reached its entire objective on schedule time, 7:20 a. m. From then until 8:30 hours later it withstood a series of enemy counter-attacks and a violent bombardment by enemy artillery of heavy calibre.

Casualties Heavy
During the assault and consolidation of the new line the regiment suffered casualties totaling 45 officers and 1,923 men, some of the companies losing 50 per cent of their strength.

The Society of the First Division, A. E. F., of which General Charles P. Summerall, chief of staff, of the United States army is president, held a reunion at Los Angeles, California, October 18-21, 1928, which was attended by First Division veterans from every state in the union.

The northwestern states and the Pacific states, including Oregon, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, North Dakota, Colorado, South Dakota, New Mexico, California and Arizona, all of which contributed its man power to the 1st "Sunset Division," sent 23,646 replacements to the First Division after the 41st had landed in France in June, 1917.

The First Division war memorial located in Washington, south of the state War and Navy building, near the White House, bears the names of 5,595 men who were killed or died of wounds. The division's battle casualties numbered more than 22,000.

Grand Jury Puts Burke Under Bail On Arson Charge
ASTORIA, Ore., May 29 (AP)—Joseph H. Burke, Portland, prominent Columbia river fish packer, was at liberty today under \$1,000 bail, after a circuit court grand jury had returned two indictments charging him with arson in connection with the burning of the Sanborn-Cutting cannery here last January.

One indictment covered the burning of real property insured at \$124,700 and the other the burning of personal property insured for \$182,500, a total insurance loss of \$307,200.

The cannery, prior to January, had been acquired by Burke and had been operated. Burke, during the fire, escaped in a launch from the burning building but other employees were forced to leap into the Columbia river to escape.

Immediately after the indictments were returned Burke and his attorneys appeared for arraignment. He pleaded not guilty to both charges and bail was set. The investigation of the cannery fire was carried on for several months by Sheriff Harley Slusher and a deputy fire marshal.

Two years ago a cannery owned by Burke burned.
