

AMERICANS IN QUARTER FINAL GAMES TODAY

Jones and Voight Paired
In Home Stretch at
St. Andrews

ST. ANDREWS, May 30. (AP)—Bobby Jones of Atlanta and George Voight of New York survived play in the quarter-finals of the British Amateur golf championship this morning along with two Englishmen, Roger Wethered of London and Lister Hartley of Chislehurst.

Pairings for the semi-final round this afternoon found Jones opposed to Voight and Hartley matched with Wethered for the right to enter the 36-hole final tomorrow.

Both Won Handily
Voight and Jones both won their morning matches in comparatively easy fashion. Jones gained a four hole lead on Eric Fiddian of Stourbridge on the first nine holes and maintained it to end the match on the 15th green, 4 and 3.

Fiddian, holder of the English boys' championship in 1927, failed to live up to British expectations in his match with Jones. He failed to control the ball in the greens and was forced to play the match with his irons, and his wooden putter didn't seem to be quite the right club for the glazed greens.

In Great Form
Jones, on the other hand, played his irons as well as Great Britain ever has seen him. He snicked the ball from the hard turf perfectly, and left himself little to do on the greens. What he had to do there he did well.

Fiddian took a brace after the turn, where he was four down, and for a moment the gallery who saw their last native hope fading against Jones' progress to the final awaited a rally like Harrison H. Johnston's yesterday.

Fiddian got back one hole at the twelfth after losing the eleventh, and held Jones level from there on, but the inevitable came at the fifteenth green. The only other hole Fiddian won was the first where Jones' drive plunged into the cold waters of Swilcan burn.

Sutton's Luck Poor
William Sutton, West Cheire, hardly was expected to stand up against the accuracy Voight has shown all week. On the famous nine, the English artisan encountered much difficulty with the stiff breeze. Voight got an eagle three at the long fifth, where he was on the green with a drive and iron and snuk a three-yard putt. He was out in 36, one more stroke than Bobby's total for the first nine. The match was ended on the fourteenth, 5 and 4.

Later Hartley of Chislehurst came from behind to beat Douglas Grant of New York and London, one up at the 19th hole.

9000 in Gallery
A gallery of three thousand persons assembled for the start of the semi-final match between Jones and Voight, and was rewarded with a great thrill at the first hole when it was halted in birdie three. The two Americans drove about the same distance, each about 250 yards. Voight pitched across the Swilcan burn and rolled 57 feet past the flag. Jones pitched short, and ran to within 15 feet of the pin. Voight holed his downhill putt for a birdie three, but Jones came right in to drop his for the half amid great applause.

Jones went one up at the second, where he scored a par four, to five for Voight. George was trapped in "Chaspe's bunker," and although he slashed into the sand and dug the ball out, he was 40 yards short of the green, while Bobby was on with his second. Jones sent his ball dead. Voight made the putt to insure the half.

There is a great temptation on the part of boys to use bats which are too heavy for them. The boy has an idea that the added weight in a bat makes up for some lack of physical strength. This is all wrong. Most of the long home-run hitters of the major leagues have always used comparatively light, thin-handled bats that they could swing easily.

The batter naturally has more control over a light bat than he has over a heavy one and is not fooled as easily by a slow ball or a change of pace.

Of course you should be sure your bat has good wood in it and is not just a light "fungo" stick. The lighter the bat feels, the greater mastery the batter holds over it. That is the reason most great hitters swing three or four bats just before their turn to hit.

Graver, Cleveland Alexander, the famous pitcher, used to toss a 12-pound shot around before warming up to pitch, for the same reason. The ball was not actually lighter, but it felt lighter.

LENHART AND LOMSKI FIGHT POPULAR DRAW

PORTLAND, May 30. (AP)—In one of the best boxing cards seen in Portland, Fred Lenhart, Spokane, and Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, light heavyweights, put on a battle last night that had the big Coliseum crowd on edge throughout, and which terminated in a popular draw.

Lenhart's ruggedness and fighting heart stood him in good stead. For the first six rounds Lomski had a decided edge. In the second Leo opened a bad cut over Lenhart's left eye, and in the fourth did the same thing to his right eye. From that time on Lenhart was handicapped by the blood getting into his eyes. But he never let up, and in the sixth round he caught Lomski on the jaw with a hard overhand right swing and charged him like a wild man. Lomski plainly sagged at the knees, but the bell rang. Lenhart had another good round in the seventh, and was forcing the fighting in the tenth. The crowd roared for a draw.

Lenhart weighed 178, Lomski 173.

Semi Popular, Too
Another hummer was the around semi-windup between Fris co McGale and Jack Kentworth, popular Salem, Ore., southpaw. It was a slam, bang affair, with McGale taking an early lead, and Kentworth coming from behind to earn a draw.

Joe Calder, Aberdeen, took a four-round decision over Johnny Hall, Los Angeles; Al Trumans, San Diego, won over Eddie Herman, four rounds, and Johnny Garvey knocked out Jack Turner in the second round of the curtain raiser.

Thirty-Eight Cars and 76 Men Embark on Speedway Classic at Indianapolis Track at 10 A. M.

SPEEDWAY, Indianapolis, May 30. (AP)—With a deafening roar from wide-open motors, 38 cars, with two men huddled in each, flashed away at 10 o'clock today in the start of the 500 mile automobile race, over the bumpy brick course of the Indianapolis speedway.

The field contained the pick of American drivers and two Italian invaders seeking a share of the \$115,000 in prize money.

As the start was made, it appeared like a glorious day for the race. The weather was a bit frosty and a stiff cold wind kept the spectators shivering and hoping for warmer temperature.

The sun shone brilliantly from a cloudless sky, however.

The crowd of more than 165,000 spectators cheered lustily as the racers started, and then settled back into their seats to watch the drivers take their chances with death in their mad dash around the two and one-half mile oval.

Arnold a Favorite
Billy Arnold, 23-year-old Chicagoan, remained a favorite with the crowd, along with two previous winners of the race, Peter De Palo and Louis Meyer.

Arnold started from the post position. The honor was accorded him because of his achievement in turning in 113.265 miles an hour, the fastest time of the qualifying trial. The cars started three abreast, and there were thirteen rows on the track when an exploding bomb was set off as the starting signal.

Memorial Day First Mile Post of Major Pennant Race

The first big holiday of the baseball season, Memorial day, is in many ways the first mile post of the pennant race. Coming in the middle of the second month of play, it marks the turn into that part of the campaign known as "mid-season."

The standings today bring promise of two fine races in the major circuits, with the National league's contenders probably more closely matched. The Brooklyn Robins and St. Louis Cardinals come up to the mile post tied for the lead as the result of yesterday's game. The Robins overcame a half-game deficiency by beating the New York Giants, 4 to 1, while St. Louis was idle.

Behind them, Pittsburgh, Chicago, New York and Boston are in a close group. The Pirates are just three games to the lead, while the other two, Cincinnati and Philadelphia, are not out of touch with the leaders.

A chance for one of them to improve its position was lost yesterday, as the Phillies and Boston met more rain when they attempted to play off a game postponed earlier in the week.

Brooklyn found a two-man combination effective in beating the

Giants for the sixth time in eight meetings. Babe Herman produced the Robin runs, driving in three with two homers, while Bill Clark prevented Giant scoring by allowing only six hits.

A's Press Solons
Washington has a clear margin of leadership in the American league, but the champion Philadelphia Athletics are pressing the Senators hard, while seven of the eight clubs have averages of .400 or better.

Philadelphia sent the Boston Red Sox deeper into the cellar with a 2 to 1 victory in a pitching duel between Leroy Mahaffey and Milton Gaston, while the Senators again found George Pipiras of the Yankees a bit too tough for them, and went down to a 4 to 1 defeat.

Mahaffey and Gaston each yielded five hits in their battle, but the Red Sox could get only one man past second base, while Regan gave the Athletics an extra counter on a bad error that was followed by Cochran's double in the seventh inning. Pipiras, the only Yankee pitcher to beat the Senators this season, repeated his previous triumphs by keeping nine hits thoroughly scattered, while his team mates made the most of five blows at opportune moments.
