**Fremont Student
Writes Winning
Memorial Essay**

Miss Margaret Carmen, eighth grade student at Fremont school, was awarded first prize in the Memorial Day essay contest which was sponsored by the veterans' organizations. Barbara Wales, Riverside student, was given second prize, and Maxine Elliott, Riverside school, third prize.

The winning essay which was read at the Memorial exercises at the Pelican theatre this morning, follows:

MEMORIAL DAY.

Memorial Day is a day appointed for commemorating the soldiers and sailors who gave their lives for their country. This day was first observed as a religious ceremony.

The Greeks, who are the first known to keep such a day, decorated only the graves which had been made that year.

The Roman ceremony, Feralia, was held in the spring, when the citizens strewed roses and violets on the graves.

The winters in England were very cold and food was scarce, so the death rate was higher in that season than in the others. Every fall the druid priests of England offered gifts to their pagan gods, so that they would have mercy on the dead.

The Chinese and Japanese people honored their dead on Lantern Day.

In 1567 the women of Columbus, Mississippi decorated the graves of both the Northern and Southern soldiers. This act had the greatest influence in doing away with the hatred which had existed between the North and South since the Civil war. In 1868, General John Logan, of the Grand Army Republic, made the first move to establish Decoration Day. He hoped that this would be observed annually. At first we decorated only graves of Civil war soldiers. After the Civil war, the name was changed from Decoration to Memorial Day.

As tribute to the men who lost

their lives at sea, every year on Memorial Day the people scatter flowers on the Potomac river, and they are carried out to sea. Every year many people decorate the grave of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington, thus remembering those who were lost.

Most states have set aside Memorial Day as a holiday, but I suggest that it be made a national holiday, so that it would be kept the same throughout the nation. Memorial Day is a day when patriotism should be made obvious by the use of many flags. The Stars and Stripes are seen in the parades, are used to decorate streets, fly from private homes, as well as on the graves of the heroes.

Patriotic speeches have always played an important part of the program for this day. The singing of our country's favorite songs in which all can take part and the playing of patriotic music by bands adds much to the keeping of the day. Veterans of the Spanish-American and World war.

**Auditing Company
Discovers Million
Dollar Shortage**

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29 (A P)—The George Black and company, auditors, announced today that in the first complete annual audit of city affairs in many years, they had discovered a book shortage of \$1,090.39 in improvement bond sinking fund and warrants that probably were valueless.

Against this shortage, however, it was pointed out the city has collected \$1,590,000 from the sale of 3,000 of the 12,000 lots it has taken over for delinquent assessments and it now has property worth \$1,650,000.

Various criticisms of the operation of city departments were offered in the report by the auditing company, but the statement was qualified with "but most of these have been corrected."
