The meeting was opened by
prayer by Rev. Preston, after
which the chairman called upon
Ensign Ford, local officer in
charge, to give the report of the
past year's activities. This was
well received by all present. There
was a discussion of the army's ac-
tivities, and a committee was ap-
pointed to look into the matter of
the future activities of the local work-
ing committee. The various minis-
ters and practically all present dis-
cussed the needs of the army work in its
various phases.

The yearly budget to provide
for the work of the local corps was
upon vote decided to be increased,
and a committee was appointed
to select a campaign chairman.
The committee of three was appointed
to look into the matter of the
mortgage upon the local property,
with a view to its reduction as
soon as possible. Letters of ap-
proval and commendation from
Mr. Paul Jackson and Mr. J. Per-
cy Wells, were read and heartily
received. Ensign Turner of Port-
land headquarters, who is in
Klamath Falls in the interest of
the local campaign, gave a much
appreciated address on the rescue
work of the Salvation Army.

Right girls from Klamath coun-
ty and their ladies have received a
total of 1040 days' care at a total
cost of \$1195. The Salvation
Army provides this place of re-
fuge free of charge. If the individ-
ual is unable to contribute any-
thing, the enlistment stated. Plans
of the campaign and the election
of the chairman and the setting
of the date of the campaign was
left to the committee in charge.
After two hours of speaking and
discussion, in which all partook,
the meeting adjourned to await
the action of the special commit-
tee appointed. Further announce-
ments will follow the appointment
of campaign chairman.
