

Bobby Jones Wins British Amateur Title

BEATS ROGER WETHERED IN 36-HOLE FINAL

American Ace Follows Policy Of Playing Against Par

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 31 (AP)—Bobby Jones today added the British amateur championship to his long string of major golf titles by defeating Roger Wethered in the 36-hole final, seven and six.

Jones followed his custom of playing against par while his opponent played Jones. The American was not over par on any hole in the morning and as he had two birdies on the round, he finished his first round, two under perfect figures.

Two Under Par
In the afternoon he went one over par on two holes but had two birdies to offset these lapses, so he was two strokes under par for the day's play.

Jones demonstrated again that "even fours will win." In the 36 holes of play he scored 22 four, three of them birdies. He had five threes, two pars and a birdie and he required five strokes on only three holes, one a par and the other two a stroke over par. Jones and Wethered found a great battle through the first nine holes of the match, starting home for the first time all square, but in the second nine of the morning, Bobby drew away and went to luncheon four up.

Again a close battle developed in the first nine holes of the afternoon round. Wethered, cutting away one of the American's holes with a sensational putt for a birdie three at the 24th hole.

The American open champion, however, regained his morning lead and added another by winning the 25th and 26th and halving the 27th, started on the last lap, five up.

It was estimated that more than 12,000 persons saw the finish, or attempted to see it. Fully 6,000 were jammed in a great circle around the 12th hole of the course—the 30th of the match—while others were waiting at other holes along the course. Wethered, after having trouble in the morning with his long game, straightened it in the afternoon and not until he played the 28th was there a hook to his drive.

28th Settles Battle

The Englishman was regarded as definitely finished when Jones started home for the last time, five up, but faint hopes persisted he might rally and make the match close. These were dampened when Jones scored a birdie at the 25th and halved the 26th. At the deciding hole Wethered had a three foot putt for a half which would have made Jones' dormie and kept the match alive for at least one more hole, but the slender Englishman missed as he had missed several others only slightly longer.

With difficulty Jones and Wethered were rescued from the crowd by burly Scot hooligans, who escorted them to the royal and ancient clubhouse for the cup presentation ceremonies.

Arnold Turns 500-Mile Race Into Parade With Himself in Role of Unchallenged Leader

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 31. (AP)—Youthful Billy Arnold of Chicago, wheeling his gray straight eight about the bricks at 100.443 miles an hour, turned the annual 500-mile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway yesterday into a parade in which he rode to victory unchallenged.

The 23 year old boy took the lead after two laps and held it all the way to the checkered flag which made him richer by \$52,150. Cheered on by a record crowd of 170,000, he finished three laps in front of William "Shorty" Cantlow of Detroit.

14 Survive Race
The fans who flocked to the speedway for the thrills got them in an unprecedented series of accidents which left but 14 survivors out of the starting field of 38 cars. One fatality resulted.

Paul Marshall of Detroit, riding as mechanic for his brother, Cy Marshall of Indianapolis, was fatally hurt when their car crashed into a retaining wall on the hazardous north turn.

The racing machine plunged over the edge of the banked turn and fell 25 feet to the ground. The driver, tossed clear of the wreckage, was in a critical condition in an Indianapolis hospital today.

Seven Cars Wrecked
Deacon Litz, driver of DeSoto, Penn., and Aaron T. Vance, of Indianapolis, riding as mechanic for Chester Gardner of Pitts-

burgh, also were injured on the north turn in a smashup that wrecked seven cars. A collision between Fred Roberts, Danville, Ill., driving as relief for Peter De Paolo and Marion Tressler of Indianapolis piled up five other machines, those of Litz, Gardner, Johnny Seymour, Escanaba, Mich., Baba Stapp, Los Angeles, and Len Moore of Los Angeles.

Although predictions were general before the race that the new rules in effect this year which brought back the riding mechanic, eliminated the super-charger, enlarged the field and lifted the restrictions on piston displacement, would slow the racing time, only the seven car smashup prevented Arnold from setting a new track record.

Louis Schneider of Indianapolis, finished third at the speedway to win 400 points to add to 15 already earned. In 1929 Louis Meyer, 1928 and 1929 driving champion of South Gate, Cal., who finished fourth won 350 points in the race.

Awards of prizes and trophies including the distribution of \$10,000 consolation money among the 33 starters who failed to finish in the money, will be made at the annual drivers' banquet here tonight.

Arnold will receive his \$50,000 for finishing first as well as approximately \$17,000 in lap prizes and other awards offered by accessory manufacturers to comprise his \$52,150 winnings.
