PELICANS TIE MEDFORD FOR LEAGUE LEAD

"Big Boy" Moser Slugs Out Victory for Team Mates

"Big Boy" Moser is the hero of the Klamath Falls Pelicans today. His praises are sung by every member of the team and every fan who saw the memorable contest at Medford Sunday.

The story runs something as follows: Klamath Falls came up to bat in the ninth inning. Moser went in to pinch hit for Ziel. There were two strikes on him and the position was such that a single or a double would be a little avail. Ziel was on first and nothing short of a three bagger would do the trick. The big boy took the next one on the nose and the ball traveled so far that it required a triple relay to get it back to the home plate. This is no exaggeration—the crowd will testify to this fact.

Completely Muddled. This circuit, closed, bringing in two runs, tied the score, 3 all. Moser then went into the field and finished the game, which, by the way, was one of the best on the coast and required twelve innings for the Pelicans to tame the Pear Pickers.

Moser, it will be remembered, was credited with losing the first game to Medford when he went in late in the contest to rest Beck. Chances for his popularity with the fans were slim after that and only by timely slick work yesterday did he redeem himself. Then fans will forget him, showing in the hot and will welcome him to one position or another with the expectation that he will repeat his performance at the bat at the crucial moment.

A Red Hot Game. Members of the Pelican squad pronounce Sunday's game the best seen in southern Oregon in many a moon. Up to the ninth it looked like the Pear Pickers were to maintain the lead, but with Moser's hit the Klamathites braced up and determined to come out on top. Hilton succeeded Beck in the box and held Medford scoreless in one of the over-time periods a neat triple play was pulled, although the third out did not count. With the bases full, a Medford batter tried to bunt. Mann caught the signal and in turn signalled for a shoulder ball. Hilton put it so close the batter attempted to dodge and in so doing hit a short pop fly. Peterson raced to the center of the diamond and speared the fly and cut off the man running to third. Granger in turn threw the ball to second. Ziel ran in from center field to cover second and to many it looked like the runner was out but the umpire said no and a perfectly beautiful triple play was blocked. Several nifty doubles were pulled by the Pelicans during the game.

Lefty Beck pitched a good game but it was desirable to give the extra inning work to Hilton, who made a good account of himself. Best hurled seven hard innings for the Pear Pickers, being succeeded by Montgomery, who fell victim to a vicious onslaught by the Pelicans. In the 12th, Mann was first up and walked. Hilton sacrificed, putting Mann on second. Means got a double and Fuller a single. Hilton again refused to allow Medford to score and the game ended, Pelicans 5, Pear Pickers 3.

The open letter suggested that Turner, who had been absent in the East seeking new talent for the Portland team, "Remain in the East and let the boys win another four or five straight games."

Turner, who returned from the East yesterday, refused to comment. Gregory was official scorer of the Pacific Coast league for the series.

OAKS, ANGELS DISLODGED BY SCRAPPY SEALS

Take Six Out of Eight From Hollywood; Go Up to 2nd Place

By Associated Press. Boasting of four victories in two days over the Hollywood Stars, the San Francisco club made the outstanding accomplishment of the week in the Pacific Coast League. By taking the series from Hollywood six games to two, the Seals moved up from a tie for fourth to second place, dislodging the Oaks and the Angels.

Yesterday morning's encounter, the third successive one taken by the Seals in ninth inning rallies, ended in a 4 to 3 score. Six double plays, three by each side, featured the afternoon game, which the Seals took, 7 to 6.

Oaks Turn Tables. Oakland turned the tables on Portland after being subjected to a series of defeats, taking both ends of a double-header, 10 to 0 and 13 to 8. Howard Craghead pitched the shutout game for the first victory, Chesterfield and Poeschl being ineffective. The Acorns started pounding the Reds in the first inning of the afternoon contest, and renewed their attack in the sixth against Mays and Matis, to overcome a Portland lead. Hurst was the winner, although Edwards threw the last three innings.

Nineteen home runs were scored in the league in yesterday's games, ten of them in the two games between the Missions and Los Angeles. The Reds took the first, 5 to 7, and the Angels the second, 5 to 2.

Reds Troupe Angels. Los Angeles scored four of the circuit clouts in the first game, but largely due to Nelson's work on the mound for the Reds, in the afternoon the Angels took a three-run lead in the first period and were never headed, although it took the combined efforts of Delaney, Peters and Beach to hold the Missions in check.

The Senators retained their league lead by taking their sixth out of the seven games played with Seattle, 4 to 2, the game being called on account of rain in the eighth.

Sacramento and Seattle will play off their postponed game today.

Twenty-Four Home Runs Made On Major Diamonds Yesterday

Twenty-four home runs were hit in the ten games, two less than set in the same number of games May 22. Babe Ruth contributed his sixteenth homer and Hack Wilson hit two to equal the Babe's total.

Yankees Downed. The Boston Red Sox ended the season's longest losing streak, turning on the New York Yankees after fourteen successive losses to win 7 to 4. Ruth did not knock his homer until two were out in the ninth inning, and by that time the game belonged to Boston. The Red Sox completed the first triple play of the American season. Cincinnati already had given the National league its first three-way killing.

The Giants put an end to Harry Sibold's great pitching performance of having completed nine straight games, as they took a double-header from the Boston Braves 3 to 4 and 14 to 3. Sibold started the second game and left in the third inning, as the Giants scored 12 runs in one frame. Walter Berget got a homer in each game.

Sad Sam Defeated. The Philadelphia Athletics, downing Washington for the fourth time in a row, and their eighth straight victory, gave Sam Jones his first defeat of the season, after he had won six games. The final count was 9 to 6, with a homer by Williams providing the margin of victory. Bob Grove handled the really tough two homers, for a perfect day.

Rules Announced. "The best two out of three sets decides the match."

Huskies Capture Northwest Track And Field Title

PULLMAN, Wash., June 2. (AP)—Winning by a margin of 13 points over Oregon, its closest competitor, the University of Washington track team won the Northern Pacific coast conference track and field meet here Saturday. The point scores were: Washington 56 2-5; Oregon 43 8-15; Washington State 37 9-10; Oregon State 13 1-4; Idaho 10; Montana 4.

Bob Robinson, Oregon, established one of the two new records set in the meet. In the pole vault he leaped 13 feet 1 5/8 inches, or five-eighths of an inch better than the 1929 mark of Jenne of Washington State.

A new distance in the javelin was made by Homer Hein, Washington State, who drove the spear 195 feet 3 3/4 inches. The old mark was 194 feet 5 inches made by Whitlock of Oregon State last year.
