Steady Increase in Sale of Farm Lands in County Shown

Purchase of 550 acres of irrigated land in southern Klamath county has recently been reported. The transaction involves approximately \$50,000 in all, although the exact amounts were not given.

In each instance the former owner of the property has retained some of his property and will remain in the county, with the buyers representing that many additional residents for this section.

Increased Activity

Recent sales of farm property in the southern part of Klamath county indicate at this time increased activity in farming, particularly in that district. Several sales have been recorded in the Malin irrigation district, as well as in the territory surrounding Malin.

A few of the sales reported are as follows:

Leonard Webber, Portland, from W. O. Smith, Malin, 30 acres in the Malin irrigation district.

W. O. Smith, Malin, from the Klamath Lake Land and Livestock company, 30 acres in the Malin irrigation district.

Charles Kinkle from the Klamath Lake Land and Livestock company, 40 acres in the Malin irrigation district.

Everett Maupin, Malin, 40 acres from Mrs. Dorothy Muir, 40 acres from the Klamath Lake Land and Livestock company.

Author Buys Farm

Malin and Gottfried, Carmel, California, from W. C. Dalton, 200 acres.

Mr. Malin, a well known author, is now constructing a mod-

ern bungalow on the heights overlooking the Tule lake valley, and Mr. Gottfried is also constructing a modern bungalow on the same heights on property adjoining that of Mr. Malin. Various other houses are now under construction, and many improvements are being made throughout that entire district.

Southern Klamath Grows

The territory near Malin is rapidly becoming a large potato producing district. One field of 20 acres of seed potatoes returned a gross income in 1929 of \$12,000, at the rate of \$600 per acre. The potato acreage in 1929 was over 250 acres with about 350 acres in prospect for 1930.

With the rapid settlement and development of homesteads west of this district, the entire southern part of Klamath county at this time is witnessing the most rapid development of any part of the county.

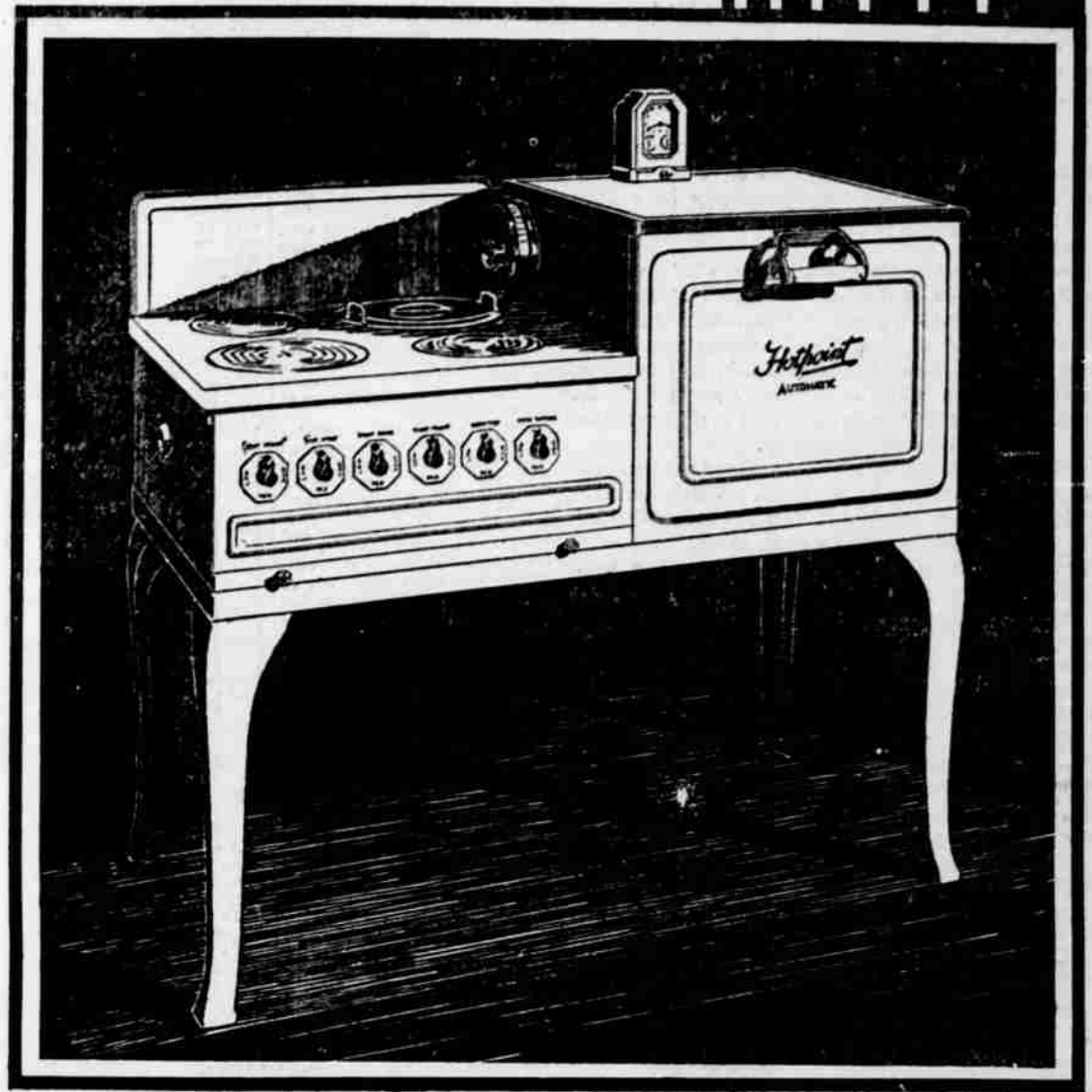
