Idaho Troopers Tamed Bugs And Rattlesnakes When Not Engaged In Taming Raiding Mexicans

BOISE Idaho, June 3, (AP)—It was a time in 1916 when the old "First Idaho" was on the border doing a bit of patrol duty to keep the Mexicans from fighting their battles on American territory.

Colonel M. G. McConnell, adjutant general of the Idaho National Guard, continues to get a laugh out of the ways the boys in the outfit tamed a hill full of rattlesnakes, tarantulas and scorpions. To make themselves a safe but not too safe camp.

The regiment moved into camp on a high place near Nogales, Ariz. It was the most acceptable camp in the vicinity, but even it was studded with boulders all the way from the size of an egg to turned of half a ton. The regiment turned in to camp there.

Every Rock Had One
What was the surprise and chagrin of the officers to find that every rock big enough to conceal one, concealed a rattlesnake, mostly the big Mexican diamond-back rattlers. The smaller rocks, unable to rise to the dignity of snakes, did their best at keeping tarantulas and scorpions from getting a too unburned complexion.

But the work progressed. Gradually the rocks began to disappear from the camp site, and with them the snakes and smaller poisoners. Not a soldier was bitten in the scuffle, but the postal authorities and visiting officers and soldiers were driven to distraction.

A Souvenir Frenzy
The Idaho troopers, fearing that their zeal in removing the rocks and snakes would exterminate the species, at least from that vicinity, took to capturing them for souvenirs. At no time, said Col-

ELKO GAMBLER PUT TO DEATH BY LETHAL GAS

R. H. White Pays Penalty
For Murder of Louis
Lavell, Gambler

CARSON CITY, Nev., June 3, (AP)—R. H. "Bob" White, Elko gambler, died Monday in lethal gas chamber at the Nevada state prison here. He had been convicted on circumstantial evidence of the murder of Louis Lavell, another gambler.

White was taken at 4:40 a. m. into the stone chamber he helped build—an air-tight room six feet long by eight wide and seven high—and strapped into a chair.

Smiles at Witnesses
He smiled and nodded to the people looking in the window. There were 53 witnesses including two women.

Before White's chair stood a two-gallon crockery jar containing a quart of sulphuric acid and half a gallon of water. Pulling a string in the next room opened a container, dropping nearly a dozen one-ounce "eggs" of cyanide of potassium into the acid solution.

The deadly gas was generated almost instantly.

White nodded again as the gas started to come up from the generator. Then he took five deep breaths, as deep as he could take. He leaned back easily. At the third breath his head fell back. His arms and body quivered as in a convulsion, then he was still.

Three minutes after he entered the death chamber he was apparently dead.

White was not a bit nervous. He shook hands with the warden and the other two men who helped strap him in the chair.

He was dressed in a blue shirt and a pair of overalls.

Nurses See Execution
Miss Margaret Skeeter, R. N., Reno, and Miss May E. Kenney, another nurse, Carson City were the women witnesses. They were admitted at their own request.

White declined breakfast. He went to sleep about 11 p. m. and when the night guard went off was still asleep. He was awakened about half an hour before the execution.

There was no minister present. White waived none.

His last act was writing a letter to his wife, last night.

His body will be shipped to Oakland for cremation.

Officially, a gas was turned on at 4:27 1/2 a. m. White's heart stopped beating for ten seconds at 4:39 1/4, and natural breathing stopped at 4:39 1/2.

After a lapse of ten seconds the heart started beating again, but stopped completely at 4:47, nine and a half minutes from the time the gas was turned on.

Pulse Reached 120
At the start White's pulse was 168, contracted to a normal of 72. One minute after the gas came on his pulse reached 120.

At 4:42 his respiration became very convulsive, long and short breaths. At 4:27 3/4 his head fell back, a quarter minute after the gas came on. Then he took five deep breaths and his head fell forward. From 4:43 to 4:46 his respiration was very convulsive.

The figures and data were given out after the execution by Dr. E. E. Hamer, state health officer, who kept a specially devised stethoscope on the condemned man throughout the execution proceedings.

Two Divorces Filed, Two Are Granted

Two divorce complaints were filed yesterday in circuit court. Ben F. Mitchell seeks a decree of divorce from Reda H. Mitchell, charging desertion in July, 1927. They were married in Yreka, Cal., December 4, 1922, and are the parents of three children.

The children are enrolled as members of the Klamath Indian tribe and each receives \$25 a month from the government. The complaint asks that they be left with their mother. Ralph M. Farmer is attorney for the plaintiff.

Louisa Harding asks that a decree of divorce be granted her from Carl Harding, whom she married in Spokane, Wash., on August 15, 1916. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, starting in 1923, and continuing until she left him in 1924. She asks the care and custody of a minor son and \$35 a month for the care and support of the boy. D. E. Fletcher is attorney for the plaintiff.

Hattie R. Davis obtained a divorce decree by default when George M. Davis failed to answer charges in the complaint. She was given the custody of a minor son. D. E. Van Caster was attorney for the plaintiff.

Roy D. Givens obtained a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony between himself and Elizabeth Givens. A minor son was given to the plaintiff who was given permission to take the boy to Mand Falls, in Castle Rock, Col. David Vandenberg was attorney for the plaintiff.

ACCIDENT ENDS IN BOY'S DEATH

Jack Harding, 11, Fatally
Injured When Struck
By Bullet

Jack Harding, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Harding, who reside about one mile from Dairy, was fatally injured yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock when he was struck by a bullet while he and Frederick Williams, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Williams, neighbors, were playing with guns.

A bullet from a 35-40 caliber rifle which Jack Harding had put in a 410 shotgun was discharged and struck Jack Harding in the abdomen.

Williams boy rushed to the barn and told a brother of the injured boy what had happened, then mounted a horse and rode a mile to Dairy where he got a neighbor to bring back Harding to a Klamath Falls hospital where he died shortly after 6 p. m.

Mr. and Mrs. Harding were both away from home at the time. Mr. Harding was at work and Mrs. Harding was at a neighbor's using a power-driven washing machine. Jack Harding, one of his brothers, and the Williams boy were playing with a rifle, a shotgun, and the 410 shotgun.

They fired a rifle shot, the Williams boy told Sheriff Lloyd Low, Deputy Sheriff Ross H. Brown, and Coroner Earl Whitlock who investigated.

The Harding boy then took the rifle shell from his pocket and put it in the small-bore
