PROCLAMATION
June 4th 1930
Whereas, Klamath Falls, Oregon, No. 1247 B. P. O. Elks and Klamath Falls American Legion Post No. 8, are preparing for and proposing a celebration to be staged in this city from July 2nd to 6th, inclusive, to be known as "THE DAYS OF '49" every way possible the personal habits and customs of those sturdy pioneers, and

Whereas, the Klamath Falls lodge of Elks and American Legion has always been among the first in support of all that has been for the betterment of the city and the welfare of the community.

Now, therefore, having these things in mind, be it resolved that the city of Klamath Falls join with the Klamath Falls Elks and Legion in commemorating those sturdy days of '49, and that all male citizens of the city allow their whistles to grow and refrain shaving during the period from this date until July 6th 1930 at the hour of 12 midnight.

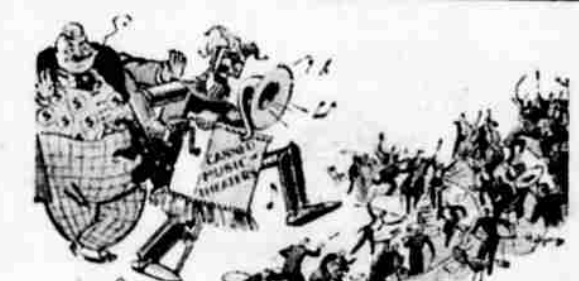
