

UNDERWOOD TO HEAD G. O. P.

Republicans Form Organization, Will Endorse Party Candidates

At a meeting held last night in the court house the Klamath county republican central committee was re-organized, and a resolution passed favoring the convention nomination method and the repeal of the direct primary law in Oregon.

The committee also passed a resolution stating that it is the "sense" of the committee to express our implicit confidence in our nominee for governor, Senator George W. Joseph, together with all candidates nominated by the party, both state, district and county.

Officers Elected
Officers of the committee to serve for the coming two years were elected without opposition and by unanimous ballot as follows: Chairman, Major C. H. Underwood; Vice-Chairman, Arthur W. Priault; Treasurer, John M. Glover; Secretary, David R. Vandenberg; State Committeeman, Arthur W. Schupp; and Congressional Committeeman, Jack E. Franey.

The resolution favoring the repeal of the direct primary system of nominating party candidates and the substitution of the convention nomination method was passed after arguments calling attention to the high cost of carrying on a campaign which it was stated prevents those without large financial resources from being candidates. It was also pointed out that the primary election recently held in this state cost in the neighborhood of \$400,000.

Schupp Withholds Vote
The small vote at primary elections, the fact that the primary allows "self starters" to be candidates were also mentioned during the debate.

Mr. Schupp called attention to the fact that he had not voted on the question and stated that he wished to further study the matter before being called upon to express an opinion.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4. (A.P.)—W. G. Ide, manager of the state chamber of commerce, said today that 265 new families came

to Oregon during the first months of 1930 and made an investment totaling \$1,057,534 in land purchases. The acreage was 48,768.

Ide also said that definite assurance that 1919 families were coming to Oregon had been received and their contemplated investment was \$2,929,070.
