

IRWIN SPEAKS OF KLAMATH'S RAPID GROWTH

States That Future Expansion Will Exceed That of Past

Declaring that Klamath Falls' amazing growth of the past ten years will be dwarfed during the next decade if the citizens continue to work untiringly in behalf of all worthwhile civic projects, W. A. Irwin of Seattle was the principal speaker last night at a meeting of the Klamath Falls Realty Board at the Pelican Grille.

Mr. Irwin as president of the Pacific Northwest Real Estate Association is the head of a party of five that is touring Oregon in an effort to bring about greater public appreciation of real estate as an investment commodity. The tour started in Portland last Monday and included Albany, Eugene, Marshfield, Grants Pass and Medford prior to the arrival yesterday afternoon in Klamath Falls. The party leaves today for Bend, The Dalles, Pendleton and La Grande.

Resources Powerful
"Resources such as fertile farm lands, timber, water power, minerals and transportation facilities are powerful in themselves but alone they cannot make a community grow to its potential greatness," Mr. Irwin said. "For the resources are of no avail unless the community has the complete cooperation and enthusiasm of its citizens."

"Los Angeles had only sage brush and cactus to start with—yet today, thanks to the spirit and energy of its people, it is the largest city west of Chicago and the second largest manufacturing city in the country. Los Angeles has brought tourists within its gates through concentrated advertising—and then the Los Angeles spirit made citizens and business out of what had been mere visitors. What Los Angeles has done—Klamath Falls also can do."

Builder of Cities
Mr. Irwin declared that the real estate broker is essentially a builder of cities. He praised the members of the Klamath Falls Realty Board, and called upon the property owners and business leaders of this city to support them in their efforts to bring settlers to the farm lands adjacent to Klamath Falls and invest into the municipality proper.

Mr. Irwin's audience numbered 40 persons, including many of the larger property owners and business men of the community. He divided his address into three parts: to the real estate broker, to the property owners and to the citizens as a whole. He urged the brokers to gain a more thorough knowledge of scientific real estate practices and to remember always the code of ethics which governs them. He invited property owners to form a separate organization to work with the realty man to bring about lower taxes on real property and to obtain legislation more favorable to their interests. To the citizenry he stressed the necessity of civic spirit.

Walton Toastmaster.
In addition to Mr. Irwin, addresses were delivered last night by J. F. Ulrich, of Salem, vice president of the association; Thomas G. Fay, Seattle, executive secretary; C. V. Johnson, Salem, deputy real estate commissioner of Oregon; Earl Reynolds, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and Bruce Dennis, publisher of the News and Herald.

Mr. Fay told of the fourteenth annual convention of the association which will be held in Longview, Wash., Aug. 17 to 20. Mr. Ulrich urged Klamath Falls brokers to work with the other realty boards of the state and Mr. Johnson told of educational plans contemplated by his department. Mr. Reynolds and Mr. Dennis welcomed the visitors and stressed the value of the real estate broker to the community.

Arrangements for the meeting were in charge of Joel T. Ward and Arthur Wilson. C. S. Montelius, president, opened the meeting and then turned it over to George Walton, who acted as toastmaster.

SEASONING WITH SALT AND SUGAR SHARPENS APPETITES

The tavern is appropriately finished in natural woods, a large open fireplace of rough field stones lends atmosphere to the interior, while Indian pottery, searapes, stone hatchets, a pogamogan, and other historic relics remind those who are peacefully dining of the aboriginal American.

The tavern will be managed by Mr. and Mrs. Jud Short, formerly of Cherry Creek Haven, and will be operated in connection with Rock Creek Fish farm. Chicken dinners will be served by appointment, and later it is hoped to include Eastern Brook and Cut-throat trout in the menu.

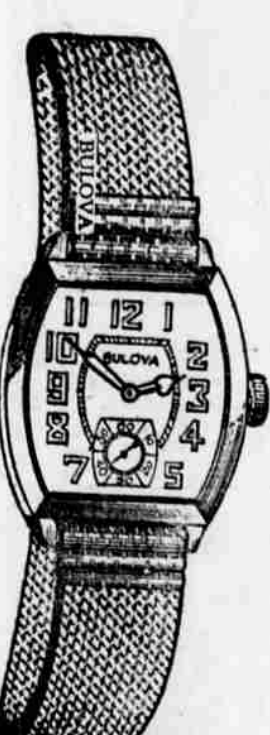

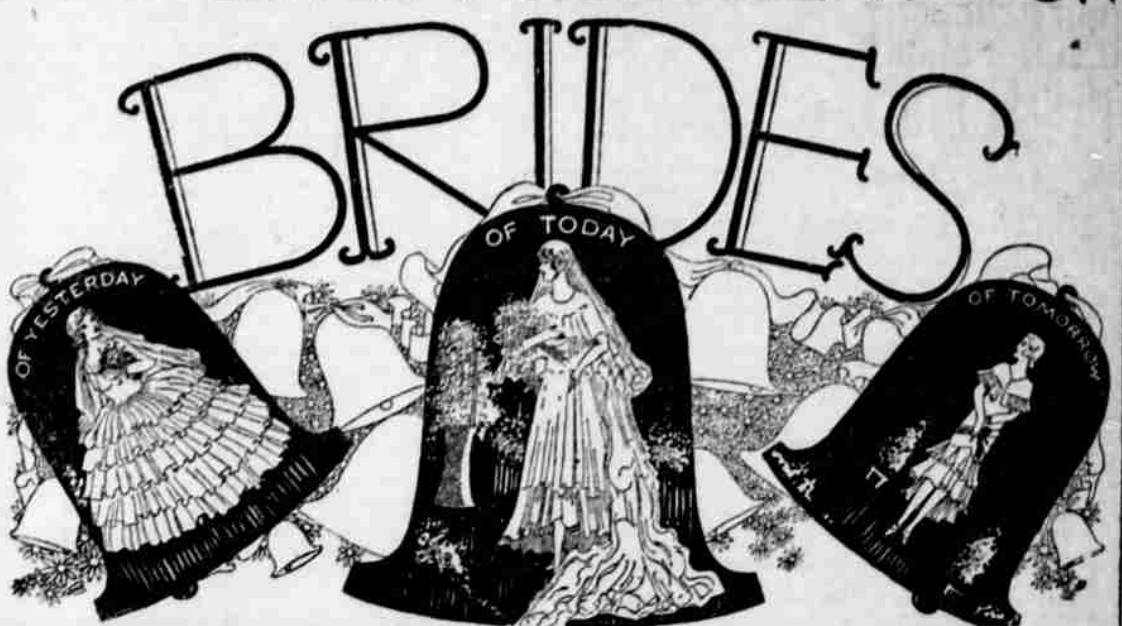
