

SHIP COMPANY GIVEN PERMIT TO SELL STOCK

New Pacific-Atlantic
Navigation Co. to
Build Five Ships

SALEM, Ore., June 6, (AP)—The Pacific-Atlantic Navigation company, which is to build five ships to operate between Atlantic ports and the Orient by way of Portland and other Pacific coast ports, and which will be the first company of its kind to make the port of Portland its home port, today received from the state corporation department a permit to sell \$5,000,000 worth of stock. The three Portland firms and individuals already have subscribed to \$3,104,000 of the stock.

Dawson President.
The officers of the company are Kenneth D. Dawson, Portland, president; Henry W. Foett, San Francisco, vice president; and Clifford J. MacMillan, San Francisco, secretary-treasurer. MacMillan was formerly California state corporation commissioner.

Mark D. McCallister, Oregon state corporation commissioner, said that the stock is to be sold without advertising, the use of a prospectus or any "high power" method. The purpose of the issue is to meet the requirements under the merchant marine act which allows the company, in this instance, to borrow approximately 75 per cent of the total amount needed from the United States government.

To Build Ships.
A report made to the corporation commissioner says that the company proposes to build immediately five combination passenger and cargo steamers to operate between Atlantic ports and Manila by way of Havana, the Panama Canal, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Japanese and Chinese ports. The construction of the ships, it is stated, will require about 30 months, and the stock subscribed under the permit will be paid for by installments over a period of 18 months. The permit expires by limitation June 1, 1931.

WHISKER PACT SIGNED BY MEN

All members of the Klamath Elk lodge who attended a meeting at the temple or could be rounded up last night signed a "Whisker Pledge" which announced to the public:

"We, the undersigned live wire members of the best Elk lodge in existence, Klamath Falls Lodge No. 1247, hereby bind ourselves to the following—Hereafter known as the Klamath Falls Elks Whisker Pledge; to wit:

"We, the undersigned, agree, to let our hair and whiskers grow for a period of time, beginning at ten o'clock the evening of June 5th and ending the final night of the big "Days of '49" celebration, at midnight, July 6th.

"We further agree to aid the growth of the above mentioned whiskers to the best of our ability, by using hair tonics, brushing, stroking, coaxing, aiding and abetting strong healthy growth of said brush of whiskers.

"We further agree to refrain from bringing in close or dangerous contact any and all inflammable materials such as hot soup, short, oversmoked cigars, flaming lip rouge, live, exposed electric wires, and that each of us will equip ourselves with a pocket model lightning rod.

"We further agree not to cut, trim, extract, bob or prune said hair and whiskers during the life of this contract, and it is the solemn duty of each and every signer hereto, to zealously watch all other signers, and should any infraction of the above agreement be noted, to report such infraction at once to proper authorities. Whereby a fine of \$25 will be imposed upon the guilty Elk. It is further understood, however, that \$25 worth of Elk money shall be given upon payment of fine. But be it further understood that each and every separate pruning of said hair and beard or both constitutes a separate and new offence."

Klamath Autoists Take Memberships With Association

He entered the chair at 12:05 a. m.

"Have you anything to say?" an official asked him as he entered the death chamber with a robed priest.

"Nothing. I have made my statement, but I would like to say that I appreciate what Father Finnegan here has done for me."

As the motors started whirling an unidentified man just outside the door fainted. He was carried away and revived.

Pruitt was convicted of slaying Mann when the youth resisted a holdup.

PRINEVILLE—P. H. Reynolds of Mitchell was reported to have been stabbed by Fred Wilson who was arrested. Reynolds' condition was reported serious. The men were reported to have been intoxicated.

CORPORATIONS PAY FEES

SALEM, Ore., June 6, (AP)—Annual payments of corporation fees from Oregon concerns are now being received by the state corporation department. The due date is July 1. During May about \$33,000 in fees was received and this month it is estimated that the payments will reach \$80,000 or \$90,000. Some payments, it was said, will be delayed until as late as September.
