Oregon Continues to do Things and a Lot of Them — Marshfield Furniture Company Imports Swiss Gang Saw — Albany is Canning Chicken — Klamath Falls Gains 234 Per Cent — Ashland Wins Back More Than 1000 Population — Californians Move to Oregon for Summer — Mining Experiences a Revival, and Seventy-five Families Come to the State Every Month.

OREGON continues to do things and a lot of them.

OVER at Marshfield the Oetting Furniture company has just imported a Swiss gang saw for proper handling of Myrtle, Maple and other hardwoods that are used in the making of high grade furniture. Heretofore this country possessed no saw suitable for the work. Switzerland produced the saw and Marshfield adopted it at once.

ALBANY is canning chicken—fried chicken—and sending it to California cities in one hundred case lots, which is not so bad an undertaking and is one that brings in more money for the Willamette valley.

THEN we turn to W. G. Ide's State Chamber of Commerce letter on new development and we read:

Something is heating the pot in Oregon. Census figures show Clackamas county has increased in population 22 per cent; Tillamook county 33 per cent; Lane county 50 per cent; Eugene 76 per cent; 24 towns centering at Eugene averaged 33 per cent; LaGrande 16 per cent; Marshfield 21 per cent; Coquille 71 per cent; Medford 85 per cent and Klamath Falls 234 per cent.

ASHLAND, which lost over 1000 of its railroad population three years ago, won them all back and 245 more; Empire is back on the map again; old Jacksonville surprised everybody with a fine gate; Newberg steps into first place in Yamhill county; Burns almost doubled and Lakeview jumped about 75 per cent. Portland goes into Class A with over 200,000 and led Tacoma and Seattle in rate of increase.

FOR summer population count 20 California families who now have homes on the Metolus river west of Bend and Redmond; add another for Curry county, a leading chemical manufacturer who has purchased large acreage for a summer home on the lower Rogue through Hoderick Macleay's salesmanship.

AT least 1500 men swelled the mining population last year. Another \$50,000 mine sale was made in Jackson county last week. More equipment, more supplies, more employment is featuring mining in Oregon now.

THE state chamber believes the 75 new families, bringing a quarter of a million dollars in new wealth into Oregon every 29 days, buying 10,000 acres of land, purchasing trucks and automobiles, household goods, groceries and farm machinery for our store keepers, using the professional services of the lawyers and doctors and opening accounts in our banks—all this is fuel that helps keep the pot boiling.

GALLANT FOX, SANDE WIN Crown Prince Carol Slated to Claim Throne

RUMANIAN PARLIAMENT FAVORABLE

Prince Makes Dramatic Entry Into Capital By Airplane

POPULACE PRESSING FOR PROCLAMATION

Parliament Was to Have Acted Today But Action Was Deferred; Premier Maniu May Resign, Leaving Way Open for Parliament to Proclaim Carol King on His Own Powers.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, June 7, (AP)—The proclamation of former Crown Prince Carol as king of Rumania today was demanded by a majority of deputies in parliament close upon the heels of Carol's dramatic return to Bucharest by airplane from his exile in France.

It had been decided earlier that Carol should be proclaimed king tonight but it was found impossible to hold a sitting of parliament which probably will be convoked tomorrow morning.

Should the government insist on the standpoint that Carol be come regent only, it is possible that Premier Maniu will resign and that parliament will proclaim Carol as king of its own powers.

The populace was reported pressing for Carol's proclamation as king.

Double Tragedy Enacted in Park By Seattle Cabbie

SEATTLE, Wash., June 7, (AP)—Carrying out a death threat which had been regarded lightly by those to whom he made it, Joseph A. Whitaker, a cab driver, shot his wife to death in Evergreen Park here last night and then turned the weapon upon himself to end his own life.

Attracted by Cries The tragedy was discovered by three youths who were attracted to the scene by the faint cries of the six months old daughter of the pair when they paused at a drinking fountain as they passed through the park. The child was found wrapped in her father's coat and seated by the dead body of her mother.

Whittaker had fired one shot into his wife's side as she sat on a park bench police said, and had then shot her through the head. He ended his own life with a third bullet, barely missing the child in his death fall. The pistol was found still clutched in his outstretched hand.

Quarreled Frequently Acquaintances of the couple said that they had quarreled frequently. A marriage certificate found in Whitaker's pocket showed that the couple was married in Tacoma in August, 1923, the wife being the former Janice L. Royal of Seattle.

WYKOFF MAKES CENTURY MARK

Leads Field at Chicago To Run 100 Yards In 9.4 Seconds

STAGG FIELD, CHICAGO, June 7, (AP)—Frank Wykoff, university of Southern California, bettered the world's record in defeating George Simpson, Ohio state, and six other stars, in the 100 yard dash opening the national collegiate track and field championships today. The time was 9.4, a tenth of a second faster than the record.

Wykoff won by a foot and a half, and did not use the controversial starting blocks. Neither did Simpson nor Eddie Tolson, university of Michigan star, holder of the world's record of 9.5.

Joe Sivak, ace of the Butler college team, stole the one mile run from Rufus Kiser of University of Washington, the 1928 champion, and Ralph Hill of Oregon. Sivak stayed with the second flight until the back stretch of the last lap and then set a sprinting pace to the finish, leading Kiser, the early pace setter, by five yards to win in 4:19.3. Sam MacKever, Illinois, came from nowhere on the home stretch and just beat Ray Swartz of western state teachers, Kalamazoo, Mich., by a foot. Hill was sixth after sharing the early lead with Kiser.

FEDERATION SUPPORTING PROHIBITION

Women Reaffirm Faith in Law and Condemn Bad Influences

PLEDGE SUPPORT TO DRY LAW OFFICIALS

General Federation of Women's Clubs of America in Session at Denver Calls on Womanhood of Nation to Defend Volstead Act and Other Laws Guarding Welfare of Land.

DENVER, Colo., June 7, (AP)—By an overwhelming vote the 20th biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs today adopted a resolution reaffirming the organization's faith in prohibition after an unsuccessful attempt had been made to delete a reference to "sinister influences" opposed to prohibition.

A standing vote on the question of adopting the resolution showed eleven in favor of striking the word "sinister," five of the eleven from Texas.

The amendment to strike was offered by Miss Florence Dibert, of Johnston, Pa., who later emphasized that she had offered it merely for the purpose of getting (Continued on Page Ten)

Ford Makes Good Run From Illinois

C. D. Armstrong, Ford dealer of Lincoln, Ill., holds an unusual record for making a 2,708 mile trip from his home to Klamath Falls in 72 hours. Mr. Armstrong came to Klamath to visit his father, whom he had not seen in 43 years.

Mr. Armstrong has been away from his home and never remembered his father's appearance, having never seen him since he was a baby. Living in Illinois, he heard of an Armstrong in Grants Pass who later moved to Klamath Falls, so he came out west to see if it was his father. A happy reunion was held here and the son returned to his home in the east.

According to Elmer Balsiger, who told of the reunion, the trip was made here in a model A Ford, a distance of 2,708 miles. An average of 37 miles per hour was made and 31 3/4 hours obtained for every gallon of gas used.

PANTAGES OUT ON BAIL TODAY

Supreme Court Grants Release Because of State of Health

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 7, (AP)—After more than seven months in the county jail, Alexander Pantages, theatre magnate, convicted of assault on 17 year old Eunice Pringle, today is at home with his family following his release yesterday on \$100,000 bail pending decision on his appeal from a one to fifty year penitentiary sentence.

Health Impaired

The show man's release was granted by the state supreme court after a consideration of evidence at three superior court hearings in which Pantages failed to win a temporary respite from jail. The high court ruled the man's life was endangered by confinement. Since his incarceration, Pantages had suffered several severe heart attacks, which forced his confinement in the jail hospital for five months. Scarcely a day in the jail hospital, tears welled in the eyes of the 54 year old multi-millionaire when he was informed that the fight he has waged for release since last December had been won. Tears again were evident when he embraced his daughter Carmen, the first member of his family to visit him after learning of the courts action.

Frank Moreland Passes in South

Word of the death of Frank Moreland, former resident of Klamath Falls, has been received here. Mr. Moreland died on June 3, at Santa Cruz, Calif., where he has been making his home. He was 55 years of age.

WOODWARD COLT BEATS WHICHONE

In Rough Going Leads Whitney Favorite Four Lengths

WINS CHAMPIONSHIP AND \$80,000 STAKES

Falling Rain and Heavy Track Fall to Keep Speed of Famous Three-year-old Colt Down and He Makes Smashing Finish: Sande in Top Form and Rides Beautifully.

BELMONT RACE TRACK

New York, N. Y., June 7, (AP)—In a smashing finish through the rain and heavy going, William Woodward's Gallant Fox, with Earle Sande up, today won the \$80,000 Belmont stakes to clinch possession of the three-year-old championship of the American turf. The Fox soundly whipped Harry Payne Whitney's favorite, Whichone, by four lengths, 50,000 See Race.

Sande and the great son of Sir Gallant Fox, thrilled a rain drenched crowd of nearly 50,000 and made turf history by adding this ancient turf classic to victories already scored in the preakness and Kentucky derby.

Only one other horse in history Sir Barton in 1919, has achieved this marvelous feat. Gallant Fox, beautifully ridden by Sande, who still wore bandages across his left eye as the result of an automobile smashup two days ago, ran a front race all the way.

Took Rail Early The big bay colt, after a preliminary break through the barrier, got off well along the rail, beat off the challenge of Swinfield and Questionnaire and then gave a sound trotting to the famous Whichone in the closing drive.
