## Mammoth Pageant and Parade One of Chief Attractions of Big Days of '49 Celebration

Chief among the numerous attractions of the "Days of '49" celebration which opens July 3rd and continues four days will be the mammoth pageant and parade on the morning of July 4th in which every phase of early day life in the west will be depicted. Stage coaches of every size and style, many of which have seen actual service in Oregon, covered wagons, burro packs and trains, "desert rats" and miners, or teams, Indians, cow boys and cow girls, women of the Days of '49 mounted on the side saddle and riding astride will be seen in the parade.

**Nothing Entirely New**  
Nothing like this parade has ever before been seen in Klamath Falls, and citizens of the community are outdoing themselves in preparation for the big event staged under the auspices of the Elks and American Legion. The entire citizenry of the community from the oldest man to the comeliest woman are leaping willing hands and hearts to the initial preparations. Not a detail will be lacking in the pageant, which will be an actual visualization of the "Days of '49" and will truly represent the hazardous and turbulent events which predominated in the days when the west was young and nothing modern will be seen.

The parade will be in charge of Captain A. D. Collier and Douglas Pickett, who invite all citizens of Klamath Falls and vicinity to come and take part, thereby helping the Elks and Legion entertain the thousands of visitors who will be here on July 4th.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7. (A P)—Bids will be opened here Monday on electric light installation in the Oregon Caves near Grants Pass. With the work of equipping the cavern with lights and one additional exit to be completed near the end of August, tourists will be able to see more of the underground wonders.
