

PRINCE CAROL CLAIMS THRONE

Carol of Rumania, who returned to his native land yesterday by airplane was picked up at a secret rendezvous "somewhere in France" by a French pilot.

The pilot was Jean La Louette who took off from Le Bourget shortly after 2:00 p. m., with Captain Popp of Rumania as his lone passenger. The aviation company today refused to give the exact location at which Carol was picked up.

Paris Interested
News of Carol's return was received with great interest in Paris which has been following with interest the Prince's career during his exile in and around Paris.

Reporters scoured the city today trying to locate Madame Lupescu, the prince's former companion, but it was ascertained that she left for Switzerland eight days ago, her departure coinciding with first reports of Carol's imminent return to Rumania.

Carol's son by his morganatic marriage to Zizi Lambrino when he was a young prince, is attending school in Paris. He is a healthy, strong little chap nearly eleven years old and today was playing in his school yard apparently oblivious to the fact that his father's name was once again on all front pages.

Mother Notified
VIENNA, June 7, (AP)—Dowager Queen Marie of Rumania received first news of the arrival of her son, former Crown Prince Carol, in Bucharest from the Rumanian minister who met her at the Vienna Railway station where she stopped enroute to Oberammergau.

Her first words were:
"As mother I am very pleased at Carol's enthusiastic welcome home. As to myself, I always will remain the faithful guardian of my people."

engers and to organize a glider club in that city. The local glider club needs only a few more members. The glider has been ordered, and is expected in Klamath Falls within a short time.

On June 15th, one of the Klamath ships is again being sent to Alturas, while on Friday, Byron Caldwell, licensed commercial pilot, with two friends, flew to Ashland on a pleasure trip. Today one of the Eaglerock ships flying low over the city, threw out hand bills advertising the

opening of Altamont Third addition on Sunday.

Pilots All Licensed
E. V. Allen and Norman Hansen, flying from the Klamath field, are both licensed transport pilots. Byron Caldwell possesses a commercial pilot's license. Forest Colson and Leo Parker have private licenses, and own the Eaglerock NC25W, internationally licensed ship. To obtain an international license the ship must comply with the regulations of the department of commerce, and be subject to inspection at all times. The Travelair ship, belonging to A. L. Travis and Byron Caldwell, bears a United States license permitting it to fly any place in the United States. The second Eaglerock ship belonging to Bill VanBuskirk, E. A. VanSickle and E. V. Allen, has an Oregon license, and must remain within the boundaries of the state.

E. V. Allen, Bill VanBuskirk, E. A. VanSickle and Leo Parker all have government airplane mechanics' licenses, which signify that these men have passed both written and practical tests.

All these things are but ordinary occurrences at present, while only a few years ago comparatively few people in the city had seen a plane, and even a smaller number had ever taken a trip over the mountains, valleys and lakes of Klamath county.

the matter before the convention. Mrs. J. C. Pearson of Marshall, Okla., chairman of the American citizenship committee, sponsored the original resolution.

Believe Opponents Sincere
"We realize," she told the convention as the amendment came to a vote, "that there are persons sincere in their belief that temperance conditions can be changed by other than the present laws. I have no objection to deleting the word 'sincere', but the time has come when we women must stand for what we believe is right, and we must lend our full support to those charged with enforcement of the laws."

Mrs. Edward F. White, former assistant attorney-general of Indiana, gained the floor to say that she thought the inclusion of the word was justified, and that she would oppose any move to delete it.

Says Press Subsidized
Mrs. White declared that a portion of the public press was "subsidized" by those persons wishing to repeal prohibition, and that the repeal movement was backed by "millions of dollars."

Virginia White Speel, of the District of Columbia, said she favored the resolution in its entirety.
"The eighteenth amendment," she told the convention, "is an integral part of the constitution. Despite everything that has been said—and I hope that you club women will not be deceived—any modification of our present laws would mean a return of the saloon."

Prolonged handclapping greeted the remark.
Mrs. Kahn Speaks
Before the final vote was put on the unamended resolution, Mrs. Otto Kahn, New York, gained recognition from the chairman to speak in favor of inclusion of the word. Only a scattering of "ayes" greeted the vote on the amendment, and the standing vote on the adoption of the resolution was taken immediately thereafter.

What was scheduled as a projected move on the part of the group of delegates to delete another section of the resolution failed to materialize. This section recited that "prohibition offers the best means for curbing the liquor traffic and its attendant crimes."

Westover Terrace subdivision extends from the highway to the Great Northern developments, and if the proposed bridge across the Klamath river is built, the direct route connecting The Delles-California and the Weed Klamath Falls highways will be through this property. Petitions are in circulation for the bridge across the river. If the contemplated bridge is built, dangerous grade crossing would be eliminated, as well as shortening the distance between Klamath Falls and the Shaw-Bartram mill about three miles.

Mysterious Fruit Disease Myth Say College Experts

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 7, (AP)—Orchard authorities at the Oregon State college today expressed surprise when informed that a "mysterious new disease" had attacked Oregon orchards and that a federal quarantine had been averted by the quick action of the Oregon horticulture board.

College authorities said no trace of any kind of "new mysterious" disease had been found in fruit received at the college.

Denied at College
Both Dr. Don C. Mote and Professor H. P. Barnes said that dispatches from Salem to the effect that specimens had been taken to the college were without foundation.

"Marion county orchards are in good shape," the professors said.

The "mysterious disease" referred to was described by H. S. Merriam, member of the state horticulture board, during a speech at Salem last week. Fruit growers and shippers of the Willamette said they would present a petition to acting governor Hamilton demanding the resignation of Merriam.

Merriam, Lane county resident, denied making the assertions and said that "if the people of Marion county want my job they are welcome to it."

Foodstuffs Lower State Board Finds

SALEM, Ore., June 7, (AP)—Practically all foodstuffs bought by the state board of control for state institutions are cheaper than they were six months ago, bids opened yesterday show.

The board paid \$12.60 a hundred for fresh beef, against \$14.25 last December. Cut meats are the same price as a year ago and six months ago, 19 cents a pound. Hard wheat flour has dropped from \$5.37 a barrel in December to \$4.65. Small white beans are \$6.90 a hundred against \$8.10 six months ago. Other decreases are in proportion.
