Blind Woman Made to See—
Friends in this city of Mrs. T. R. Markwardt, well known Chiloquin matron, will be glad to learn that a delicate operation performed recently in San Francisco has restored to her sight in one eye. The operation was not successful in the other eye. Mrs. Markwardt had been blind for more than four years, since a severe illness, and had been going to the south regularly for treatments which proved futile until the operation was undertaken.

Predatory Animals Killed—
During May, 34 hunters worked all or part time and took 322 coyotes, 26 bobcats, 4 cougars and one predatory bear in the state, making a total of 353 animals. In addition, three mountain cougars were destroyed, and 13 badgers, 126 porcupines and five skunks were taken in the course of this work. Charles Glasgow of Klamath county was listed in those having the largest catches, having a total of 15.
