University of Oregon To Grant Degrees During Week

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 11, (Special).—During the past year students from Klamath county have been unusually active in campus affairs at the university.

Seniors from Klamath county are:

Norman Thomas Stoddard, who will graduate this year, taking a B. A. degree from the school of business administration, is from Modoc Point. For the past year Stoddard has been president of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon, being probably the most important student figure on the campus this year. He acted as chairman of the publication of the yearbook, "The Oregonian," and was elected president of the National Student Federation of America, held at Stanford university, January 1-4. It was through his efforts that the University student body recently adopted a new improved constitution, which is a forward step in the development of student government.

Stoddard was recently elected to membership in Alpha Kappa Psi, men's national professional commerce honorary. In addition he is a member of Psi Chi, national honor society, and of Phi Delta Theta, national social fraternity.

Miss Cummings Prominent

Prominent among the women of the campus is Margaret Cummings, a junior in music, who was elected president of the Associated Women Students. She was elected vice president of the annual congress of the National Student Federation of America, and was chairman of the Alma Mater song contest. She was one of twelve girls who served on the Junior Sibley Day directorate. During spring vacation Miss Cummings was in charge of a spring dance, held in Klamath Falls under the direction of the A. W. S.

Kenton Hamaker, who is a senior in the school of architecture, is another prominent student. For the year 1929-30 he was chairman of the A. S. U. O. music committee, a member of the Home-Coming directorate, and of the Rally committee. 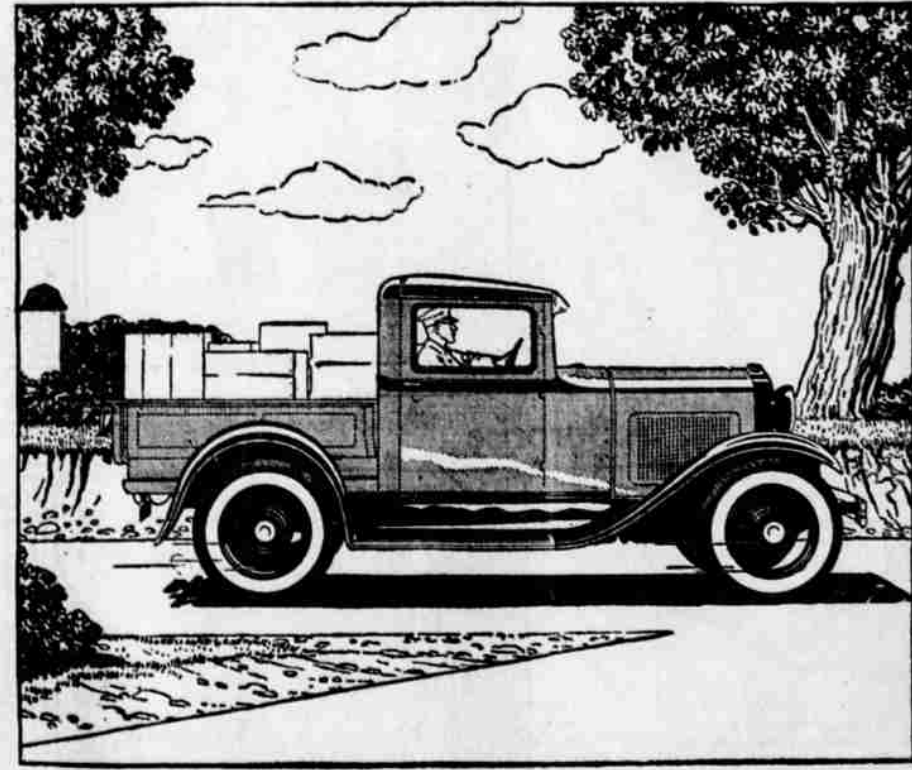
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
