## ROBINS SHOW HEELS TO ALL OF NATIONALS

### Continue 5-Game Lead Despite Nine-Game Run of Giants

Despite a nine-game winning streak by their dread rivals, the New York Giants, Wilbert Robins' amazing Brooklyn Robins continue to show their heels to the rest of the National league field and confidently look forward to their first pennant since 1920.

The Giants, despite their long string of wins, still are five games out of first place.

The Giants took Pittsburgh over the hurdles, 9 to 2, yesterday, but gained not one inch of ground as the Robins, behind Dazy Vance's great pitching, nosed out the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1.

**Lopez's Single Wins**

Vance held the Reds to four hits but it took a pinch single by Al Lopez in the ninth to bring the Robins victory. Curt Walker's pinch home run in the eighth had tied the score, but in the ninth the Robins killed the base and Lopez, batting for Vance, broke up the ball game with a single.

The Giants slammed Maine and Jones for 16 solid hits to trouble the Pirates who found Karl Hubbell a mystery, but could not solve it. The Giants had the game won as early as the sixth inning, leading by 4 to 2, but decided to make it safer by scoring twice in the seventh and three times in the eighth when Mel Ott clouted his 13th homer with two on base.

**Cubs Change Course**

Charley Root's fine pitching enabled the Chicago Cubs to break their losing streak at Philadelphia's expense, 6 to 2. Cuyler's homer with two on in the third gave Root all the runs he needed to win. The victory left the Cubs in second place, three and a half games behind the Robins and a game and a half ahead of the Giants.

In the American league, Washington's Senators advanced to within a game and a half of first place by whipping Chicago, 2 to 1, while the Philadelphia Athletics were bowing to Cleveland, 6 to 2.

**Grow Drops One**

Lefty Grove, Athletics' left handed ace, went nearly two months without losing a game but was charged with his second defeat in as many days yesterday. He was so puzzled to the Indians and retired in favor of Ernie Shore after the seventh inning with Cleveland leading 1-1.

Washington scored the winning run against Chicago in the ninth inning. Hadley, Washington pitcher, allowed only two hits for seven innings but was removed after Smokey Jolley's triple with Kerr on tied the score in the eighth. Braxton held the Sox safe thereafter.

Detroit put on a seven-run rally in the seventh to trounce the New York Yankees, 13 to 7. Owen Carroll, former Tiger pitcher traded to New York, was driven out of the box in the fifth inning and Gomez, McEvoy and Johnson were not much better. Other scheduled major league games were postponed.

## President-Elect Prestes Returns Good Will Visit

WASHINGTON, June 12, (AP)—Julio Prestes, president-elect of Brazil, today returned the good will visit which President Hoover made to Brazil while president-elect.

Accompanied by Francis P. White, assistant secretary of state, and the military and naval aides of the White House, Mr. Prestes was received by Mr. Hoover in the historic blue room.

After an informal visit of ten minutes, the two posed on the front porch of the White House for photographs. With them were Secretary Stimson, Ambassador Amaral, the military and naval aides and officials of the Brazilian embassy.

## Southern Cross Remains on Land

DUBLIN, June 12, (AP)—Another day's delay in the start of the "Southern Cross" on its trans-Atlantic flight was announced today by Captain Kingsford-Smith. He said he hoped to take off Friday.

"I am very depressed by the delay," he said, "but it would be foolhardy to dash off to merely hope that weather conditions might improve. No risks will be taken in this flight and although there still is a slight chance of the weather improving by Thursday I fail to see how we can get away before Friday."

## Valuable Handbag and Bills Missing

PORTLAND, June 12, (AP)—Police today investigated the robbery of an apartment occupied by Miss Eva V. Kelso, who told authorities a gold hand-bag valued at \$400, containing two \$100 bills had been taken from her rooms while she was absent.

LOS ANGELES, June 12, (AP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, veteran wrestler and one-time claimant to the title of world champion, won two falls out of three from Everett Marshall, La Junta, Colo., heavyweight, in an exhibition here last night.

Marshall won the first fall in 31 minutes, 15 seconds, with a backward body slam after an airplane spin. Lewis took the second in 18 minutes, 25 seconds, with a headlock, and the third in 8 minutes, 27 seconds, with another headlock.

A crowd of 9,000 witnessed the exhibition.

## Little Ol' New York Again Big Fight Town as Giants of Ring Meet for Championship

NEW YORK, June 12, (AP)—Little Ol' New York was again the big fight town today with its rush and roar as the backstage ground for a world's heavyweight championship match between the youthful German from Hamburg and the hope of the homebreeds, a Lithuanian American from Boston.

Tonight, some 45 minutes from the heart of Broadway, where the old-timers bellowed defiance at each other, Jack Sharkey and Max Schmeling swap punches for 15 rounds or less, each seeking the same object—recognition as the heavyweight king and successor to the retired ruler, Gene Tunney.

**Gentleman Gene Expected**

At the ringside, perhaps in evening clothes, gentleman Gene was expected to see the new monarch of Maul crowned with store once again the line that has seldom been broken since John L. Sullivan became the first world-recognized king of glovefighters.

With fair weather assured, close to 75,000 spectators, featuring a notable ringside assembly, figured to pay something like \$750,000 in the interests of charity and for the privilege of seeing a fresh chapter unfolded in heavyweight history.

**Times, Scenes Change**

The scenes, the times and the gladiators in this flistic extravaganza, promoted by a corporation whose directors are millionaires, and whose stock is sold in Wall street, represent a far cry from the June night at Coney Island, 21 years ago, when James J. Jeffries won the heavyweight title from freckled Bob Fitzsimmons before a crowd of 19,000.

On that memorable occasion, the chief of police was at the ringside to stop the bout "after the first hard blow" but he said everything was "all right" after Jeffries, then a 22-year-old kid, knocked out the veteran, Fitzsimmons in the 11th round.

In the spacious American league ball park tonight, seven times as many people as witnessed the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons encounter, hoped to see many a "hard blow" struck in return for their devotion to the box-office to the extent of paying from \$2.10 to \$26.25, or more at the spectators' price, for a seat.

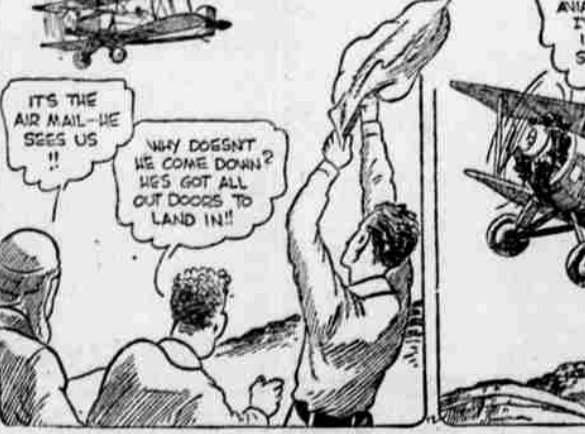
