Current Book Reviews

"Field of Honor", by Donn Byrne. Published by The Century Co., New York and London.
This novel is the last ever to be written by that Irish weaver of romances, Donn Byrne, whose life was untimely ended in an automobile accident about a year ago.

"Field of Honor" is the romance of Garrett Gilson, a young Irish nationalist, and his wife, Jocelyn, who takes pride in her rebel ancestors, woven against the period of Napoleon's fall in Europe. Garrett believed that Ireland's future would be brighter if she were more closely allied to England and so, enlisted as a private secretary in the service of Lord Castlereagh whom Garrett trusted to carry out his dreams for his country. Jocelyn whose intuitions made her distrust Castlereagh, had implicit faith in the Irish people to work out their own salvation without

English aid or interference. Both Garrett and Jocelyn were sincere in their views. While respecting those of the other, each was held by honor and honesty to his own form of patriotism to the point of almost dissolving their marriage. The storm and stress of war in Europe found its echo in their lives. Finally Garrett realized that Lord Castlereagh was a politician and not the man of honor and love of country that he had considered him.
It is a beautiful story delightfully and delicately told. Anyone becoming interested in this story will want to read some of Byrne's earlier tales which are written in the same fanciful and poetic manner. Those who have enjoyed his stories will want to read his book, "Ireland, the Rock Whence I was Hewn", which was published after his death and which helps one better to understand the Ireland of Donn Byrne.

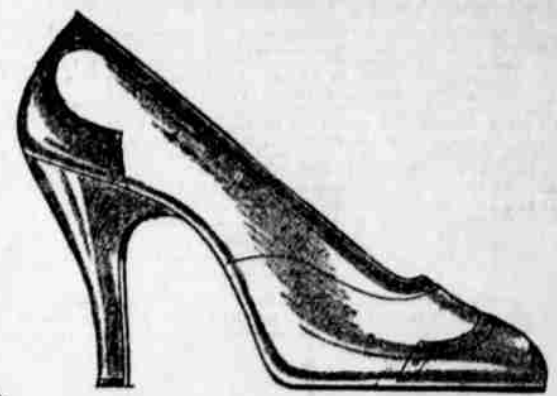

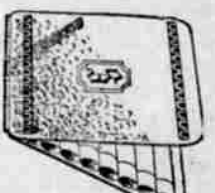
