

COLLIER HEADS CAMPAIGN FOR ARMY'S FUNDS

Appoints Chairmen of Committees to Lead in Local Work

Andrew Collier has been chosen by the advisory board of the Salvation Army corps of Klamath Falls to direct the campaign for funds to open Tuesday morning, June 17. Mr. Collier assumed active management of the campaign in a recent meeting of the advisory board and at that time named chairmen of several committees to get the work under way.

Committees Appointed

H. V. Collins, manager of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., for the Klamath Falls district, was selected to head the publicity committee. Mr. Collins is directing the newspaper publicity and selecting speakers to appear before the various civic organizations. He is assisted by Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

Mrs. R. H. McCartney is in charge of the women's division of the campaign. Mrs. McCartney has already appeared before the library club and the Business and Professional Women's club. She is selecting help from the women of the community to carry on the solicitation program which opens Tuesday morning.

The committee for arranging districts is under the leadership of Bert Thomas. He is being as-

sisted by Andrew Collier and Ensign Ford and Turner.

Selection of teams is headed by Mr. Collier, and he has chosen A. Wilson, Mayor Walters, Earl C. Reynolds and Rev. Wemett as his assistants.

R. C. Groesbeck and E. W. Vannice have charge of the campaign breakfast which will be held at the Pelican Grille Tuesday morning at 7:30.

Success Assured

With these committees working, Mr. Collier feels that the success of the drive is assured. The plans call for an exhaustive campaign, with calls on every business house, including employees, and a large part of the residential section. It is believed the work of the army will be more fully appreciated if every one does his or her part, although that part may not be large in a financial way. It is better to have hundreds giving a little than a few giving it all and the burden will not be great on anyone.
