

OREGON STATE FORESTER DIES AT AGE OF 65

Frank A. Elliott Had Been in Poor Health For Several Years

SALEM, June 12 (AP)—FRANK A. ELLIOTT, Oregon state forester, and head of that department since its organization about 20 years ago, died at his home here last night. He was 65 years old.

Elliott had been in ill health for a number of years. Some years ago he suffered a paralytic stroke, and though he recovered from that, his health had not been good since. A recent pneumonia attack and a weakened heart condition contributed to his complete collapse yesterday after he had been forced to his bed last weekend. He was at his office Saturday, but was unable to take up his duties Monday.

Built Up Service

Elliott had built up the state forest service to an effective degree, the first patrol system being organized under his direction being one of the strongest in the United States. The Oregon department, under his direction and in co-operation with the federal government, was one of the first states to use airplane patrols in forest fire protection work. Of late Elliott had given much attention to reforestation, and worked for the passage of the state reforestation act by the 1925 legislature.

Born in Illinois

Elliott was born near Danville, Ill., in 1865, and came to Oregon in 1888. He located at Newberg, where he was in charge of the distribution of Oregon-California grant lands. Much of his forestry experience was gained at that time, and he followed forestry most of the time from 1890 to 1910, except the year 1893, when he joined the Klondike gold rush. He entered the employ of the Charles K. Spaulding Logging company in 1909, and the following year was appointed state forester.

Leaves Wife and Son

He is survived by his widow and a son, John J. Elliott of Salem, manager of the State Savings and Loan association, and by the following brothers and sisters: George Elliott of Newberg, Mrs. O. P. Parker of Portland, Mrs. O. P. Clarke of Georgetown, Ill., Mrs. Thomas Reese of Vermilion Grove, Ill., and Mrs. L. L. Vaught of Great Falls, Mont.

Elliott was a member of the Friends church, the Elks lodge, the Rotary club, the chamber of commerce and the Illinois Country club, which he served as president.

The funeral probably will be held Friday.

Elliott's successor will be elected by the state board of forestry.

Chiloquin Fiddler Enters '49 Contest
