### Tells of Grasshoppers—

A dealer in monuments is G. D. Grizzle of Klamath Falls, who is at the Hotel Portland. South of the town in the Tule lake district, which has been invaded by grasshoppers for the past two years, there are no signs of the pests this year. Two years ago, when poison was put out, there was a line five miles long and 500 feet deep, composed of dead grasshoppers, and by count there were 800 grasshoppers to the square foot. Tons of poison was used. It was brought in by the carload. After a couple of seasons of intensive fighting, the pests were eradicated until this season a grasshopper is as rare in the Tule lake region as eagles are in Portland's metropolitan area. The extermination is worth thousands of dollars to the Klamath basin and the state as a whole.—Oregonian.

## THREAT TO USE CLUBS AND GAS QUELL RIOTS

### Inmates of Mansfield Reformatory Create Disturbance.

MARSHFIELD, O., June 13. (AP)—The threat of swinging clubs and tear gas bombs had restored order at the Mansfield reformatory today after a second outbreak which guards beat the ringleaders of 1,600 howling inmates into submission. The latest disturbance occurred during the "big supper" hour late yesterday when the 1,700 prisoners in the dining room became noisy, tipped over tables and hurled their stools around. Two hundred of the inmates led outside, apparently without intention of avoiding injury rather than attempting escape.

**Police Assist**  
Thirty Mansfield police and Richland county deputy sheriffs, armed with tear gas bombs and riot guns, augmented the prison guard at the request of Superintendent T. C. Jenkins when he feared the situation might become serious.

The disorder was put down when guards entered the dining room and clubbed down a few of the ringleaders. Six of the men believed to have inspired the outbreak were in corrective cells today.

The disturbance was the work of the regular inmates only, the 450 prisoners transferred from the state penitentiary after the Easter Monday fire disaster being in their cells at the time.

**Prepare for Break**  
Less than two weeks ago a number of the prisoners attempted a break for liberty and one of them was shot and killed by a guard. Reports that another break was planned for last Monday resulted in arming extra guards with machine guns and tear gas bombs.

### Oregon Student Killed in Wreck North of Redding

REDDING, Calif., June 13. (AP)—Edwin K. Otis of Alameda, a student at the University of Oregon, was killed, and Lockwell Rogers of Pasadena, also an Oregon student, was badly injured, in an automobile accident north of here early this morning. The accident occurred on a curve, and the car left the highway and rolled over an embankment. Otis' injuries caused his death at once. Although Rogers was seriously hurt, his condition was not regarded as critical.

### Sixty Three Miles Of Highway Work To Be Contracted

SALEM, Ore., June 13. (AP)—Contracts covering about 63 miles of highways will be let by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland June 24. One bridge and two buildings will be included in the bidding. The projects are:

**Clackamas county—**Multnomah county line—Sandy section of Mt. Hood highway, 6.9 miles of concrete paving.

**Coos county—**Haynes Blough, Larson Blough and Russell points units of Roosevelt coast highway, 1.29 miles of grading.

**Lane county—**Triangle Lake—low pass summit section of Siuslaw highway, furnishing broken stone.

**Lincoln county—**Pioneer mountain—Eddyville section of Corvallis-Newport highway, 15.1 miles of broken stone surfacing.

**Union county—**La Grande—Hot La Grande section of old Oregon trail, 7.24 miles of roadbed widening and gravel shoulder construction.

**Wasco county—**Wapinitia—Munip Junction section of Wapinitia highway, 7.4 miles of grading.

**Washington county—**Multnomah county line—Middleton section of West side Pacific high-

way, 9.3 miles of regrading and rock shoulder construction.

**Mitchell-Willow Creek section of Ochoco highway,** construction of 18 miles of broken stone surfacing.

**Coos county—**Construction of frame storage building at Coquille.

**Klamath County—**Construction of addition to department shop building at Klamath Falls.

**Marion county—**Bridge over Dritt creek on Silverton-Willard market road south of Silverton.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 13. (AP)—At a meeting of the soldiers' home committee of the Roseburg chamber of commerce today it was decided to center work upon securing the present soldiers' home as the site for the proposed national home in Roseburg.

A bill now before congress voting two million dollars, is expected to be passed soon by the senate. The committee will come to Roseburg during the summer, according to present plans, to definitely locate the site.
