WASHINGTON, D. C., June 13, (AP).—Four bills of Representative Hawley of Oregon, including the Champong Memorial Bill, went down in the House Wednesday and were stricken off the calendar, due to active protest by three Congressmen, one of whom was Representative Laguardia of New York. The rules of the House, taking a bill off the calendar under three objections, were enforced and will remain so unless Hawley, in the next 10 days, can move Speaker Longworth to an order suspending the rules.

Hawley got up to protest against the action, but resumed his seat after looking around the floor of the House.
