ATHLETICS GO DOWN BEFORE INDIAN ATTACK

Clevelanders Roll Up Seven Victories to Reach Top.

The Cleveland Indians, picked to finish no higher than fourth place in the American league pennant race, today are out in front after a whirlwind dash to the top that has left the remainder of the clubs and the Athletics in particular, groggy.

With a clammy, slip-sliding brand of pitching and a murderous attack, the Indians yesterday rolled up their seventh straight victory and their third over the world champions to go into the lead by four points.

Humble Champions
As if to make their advance into the leadership even more impressive, the Indians downed the champions 15 to 2 as Wesley Ferrell turned in his tenth victory of the season. George Wallberg, usually the nemesis of the Cleveland batters, was no puzzle and before the game was over he had been driven to the showers and Eddie Rempel called to his coaches.

The Senators took the White Sox into camp 6 to 2 when Ad Liska held Chicago to four hits. The victory left the Senators only a half-game out of second place.

Hunting Duel
At St. Louis Rip Collins and Milton Gaston staged an old-fashioned hunting duel as the Browns defeated the Red Sox 1 to 0 in eleven innings. A single by Ralph Kress broke up the contest.

In contrast Detroit and the New York Yankees put on a modern game of baseball—slamming the ball to every corner of the field as the Yankees won 10 to 9. A total of 27 hits were collected by both teams. In the sixth inning, Sam Rice hit the ball out of the park with two on base to give the Yanks a safe lead.

League Loses One
In the National league, Adolfo Luque, a veteran of many a major league game, lost his first contest of the 1930 season when the Cincinnati Reds pounded out an 8 to 5 triumph over the Brooklyn Robins. Although hit hard Luque stuck by his guns for the entire nine innings in an effort to stop his former teammates.

The Chicago Cubs managed to nose out the Phillies 7 to 6 in a see-saw contest. Gabby Hartnett, Cubs catcher, pounded out two home runs to lead the attack while Chuck Klein, the leading National league hitter, hit safely in his twenty-second consecutive game.

Braves Win 9-8
Rained out for two days, the Cardinals and Braves finally came together with the latter winning 9 to 8 in ten innings. Singles by Welsh and Maranville and a fielder's choice gave the Braves the winning run.

Southpaw Bill Walker turned in his eighth victory of the season when the Pirates thrashed the Pirates 7 to 2 in the last game of the series. Walker held the Pirates to six scattered hits and drove in two with a timely single.

Boxing Officials Unwilling To Award Championship Over Showing of German Contender

NEW YORK, June 14, (AP)—Officially and unofficially, it would appear, the heavyweight throne, vacant for nearly two years, will have to await another twelve months for a lawful occupant.

There no longer is any doubt that Max Schmeling was seriously hurt by a low left hook Jack Sharkey landed in the fourth round on their 15-round title bout on Thursday but public opinion seems almost unanimous in its view that the teuton youngster cannot, by any stretch of the imagination, be entitled to the championship. Sharkey was leading by such a wide margin when the low blow was struck that most experts contended it would be absurd to vote "Der Max" into the title.

Heavy Situation Unchanged
In short, the heavyweight situation remains exactly as it was before the ill-fated battle was fought. If anything, the contendership claims for young Stribling and Phil Scott both have been strengthened by the result of Thursday's fiasco. Both, in the opinion of most experts, gave Sharkey a better run for his money than did Schmeling in the four rounds the battle lasted.

Initial attempts to bring about a return match between Schmeling and Sharkey met with an abrupt check from Schmeling who announced he would sail for home in August. Max plans to

CHRISTIAN ON TOES IN RACE AT VANCOUVER

Needs a "Don Moe" Finish to Help Him Retain Golf Championship.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 14, (AP)—A "Don Moe" finish was virtually the only hope of Neil Christian, Portland professional, retaining his Pacific northwest open golf championship today.

At the end of the first 36 holes yesterday in the 72 hole tournament, Christian trailed five other Pacific northwest aces with a total of 151.

Duncan Sutherland, diminutive Vancouver pro, led the field with an even par figure of 146. Bert Wild of Bellingham and Joe Mozell of Medford, Ore., were close on Sutherland's heels with 147 each, and Phil Taylor of Victoria and Dave Mack of Vancouver were riding in third place with 150 each.

Johnny Jones of Seattle was even with Christian with 151 and unless the Waverly club pulls some birdies out of his hat today, he will likely give way to a new champion.

Don Moe, whom the Vancouver golf officials had hoped would compete in the Pacific northwest amateur tournament here next week conquered Phil Stout in a Walker cup match in England after he had been seven down and only 15 holes to go. Moe has not returned from England.

Christian hoped to duplicate at least part of Moe's feat in a medal way.

K. G. Storey, Spokane country club star, was the low scorer among the 23 amateurs yesterday with a total of 155. He tied Fred Henwood of Seattle and Clyde Shoemaker of Aberdeen to rank eighth.

Other leading scorers included: Walter Pursey, Seattle and Norman Smith, Portland, 152; Ivan Johnson, Portland, 153; Willie Price, Olympia, 155; Gordon Richards, Tacoma, 157, and Ray Ball, Tacoma, 159.

The two day tournament was to close today with the annual Pacific northwest amateur meet for men and women scheduled to start next Monday and continue until Saturday.

Mrs. Moody Takes Lead in Play for Wightman Trophy

WIMBLEDON, England, June 14, (AP)—Mrs. Helen Jones Moody, world's champion for three years, was extended to the limit in the opening set of a match with Mrs. Phoebe Watson of England today, but came through to win at 7-5, 6-1, to give the United States a lead of three matches to two in the series for the Wightman cup.

Mrs. Moody, with her usually powerful service somewhat below power, dropped the first five games of the match to Mrs. Watson, the player who yesterday defeated Helen Jacobs.

Against the withering cross fire of the rangy English player, firm-ly entrenched on her base line most of the time, it seemed impossible for Mrs. Moody to pull out of the set, but this she did, at last striking her stride, and sweeping seven straight games to do it.
