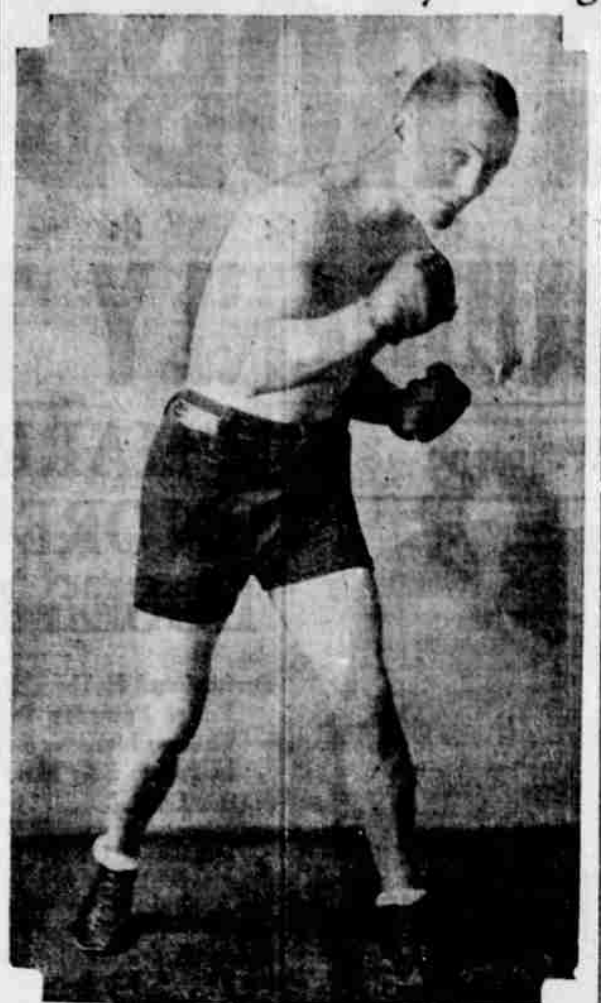

Sacramento and Seattle were the gamblers in yesterday's eight games closing the tenth week of the first half Pacific coast league baseball season. The Senators took two games from Oakland, 9 to 3 and 3 to 4, maintaining a firm hold on first place, and the Indians, downing Portland twice, 3 to 0 and 7 to 1, climbed out of the cellar where they had been for a day.

Tony Freitas got revenge for Wednesday's defeat by trimming the Oaks in the morning contest at Stockton. Howard Cracked took further punishment at the hands of the league leaders in the afternoon at Sacramento, when he lost a see-saw affair due to a ninth inning rally which gave the Senators the tying and winning runs.

San Francisco ended the week in second place, clinching its series with Los Angeles by taking the second game yesterday, 10 to 5, after losing the opener, 4 to 6. The Seals started the scoring in the first of the initial game, with Elmer Jacobs on the mound, but were soon headed, Clyde Barfoot hurling consistent among the writers, takes on our favorite Young Sam Langford. ATHLETICS GET BREAK AND GO IN LEAD AGAIN

Lefty Groves' Pitching And Yank Batting do The Business

Thanks to the good left arm of Robert Moses Grove and the powerful bats of Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth, the Philadelphia Athletics are leading the American league again today.

Grove's invincible pitching yesterday enabled the Athletics to whip Detroit, 10 to 1, while Gehrig and Ruth were batting the Yankees to a 17-10 victory over Cleveland, erstwhile pacemakers in the circuit. These two results combined to send the Athletics back into first place by a margin of one full game.

Gives Four Hits

Grove gave the Tigers only four hits while the A's pounded Sorrell, Herring and Sullivan for 14 solid blows, one being Jimmy Fox's 14th homer of the year. Gehrig hit his 16th and 17th and Ruth his 21st home run in the Yankee massacre of Cleveland. "Hungry Lou" drove in seven runs for one of his best batting days this season. Herb Pennock went the route for the Yankees and pitched no harder than he had to. The largest crowd, 33,525, that ever saw a game at Cleveland was on hand.

Browns Nick Crowder

The St. Louis Browns nicked their old playmate, Al Crowder for two runs in the ninth to nose out Washington, 3-2. Crowder, traded on Saturday with Heinie Manush for Goose Goslin, blanked the Browns for six innings but weakened in the closing stages of the struggle with a four-base drive in the sixth.

In the National league the New York Giants advanced to within a game and a half of second place by whipping the Chicago Sox, 7-4.

Robins lost ground to the Giants by dropping a 2-4 decision to the St. Louis Cardinals. The Cards took advantage of five Brooklyn errors to score nine

Charles McGinnis Killed in Wreck

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—Charles McGinnis, 31, of Gresham, Ore., veteran automobile racing driver, was instantly killed yesterday at the speed bowl, near Portland, when his car crashed through the fence in front of the grandstand. McGinnis was tuning up his racer preparatory to participating in the race. As he finished a lap he lost control of his car, which turned from the track and catapulted through the fence, planing McGinnis underneath. His skull was fractured and he died shortly afterward. He is survived by his widow and a 4-year-old son.
