Busy Session of Kangaroo Court Held Saturday at Elks Temple

All officers reported for duty at 8 o'clock. Proceedings after that follow case by case:

Dick Reed arrested for having only two weeks' growth of whiskers. Case dismissed after finding empty bottle of hair tonic in pocket.

Harry Boivin, prosecuting attorney, fined \$50 for being late for court session.

All Charges Made

David Vandenberg fined \$50 for contempt of court.

Byron Hardenbrook charged with having a still in his whiskers, fined \$25.

Henry Ruffin fined \$12 for forging another man's name on the Elks whisker pledge.

O. Dean pleaded guilty without knowing the charge against him, so was fined \$25 for perjury.

Walter Henry, charged with vagrancy, fined \$25 and must leave town by daylight.

Jack Fowler fined \$25 for perjury.

H. Wolford was fined \$20 for imitating Otis Dean and pleading guilty before he heard the charge.

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 16, (AP)—The first annual convention of the Western Society of Soil Science opened here today with nearly fifty leading scientists of eleven western states attending. Dr. W. L. Powers, chief in soils at Oregon State college, and president of the society, presided. In opening the two-day meeting Dr. Powers declared those specialists who were attending the conference are responsible for the program of utilization and conservation of soil resources developed in the west in recent years.

Could Double Irrigation

One of the most important discussions to be heard at the meeting will be the findings of a group of specialists on the occurrence, development and economic use of ground water resources.

Dr. Powers said in this respect: "If we save the water now being wasted in irrigation projects we could double the irrigated area."

The removal of soluble salts in alkali soils is another important question to be discussed, since there is nearly a quarter of a million acres of black alkali land in the Pacific northwest, and 75,000 acres in Oregon. That such soil can be reclaimed, Dr. Powers said, is shown by the fact that the oldest alkali experiment station in the northwest, established at Vale, Ore., in 1921, last year produced
