

MANNIX FILES PETITION FOR NEW HEARING

Avers Court Erred in Denying Him Right To Prove Charge

SALEM, June 16, (AP)—Thos. Mannix, who was permanently disbarred by the state supreme court from the practice of law in Oregon at the same time that similar punishment was meted out to George W. Joseph, republican nominee for governor, has filed with the court a petition for re-hearing of his case.

In his petition Mannix recalls that Joseph, who brought the charges against him, accused him of passing worthless checks, and avers that the court refused to allow him the constitutional privilege of introducing evidence to prove the falsity of the charge.

Governor Urges More Interest in Military Events

This annual event has in the past attracted tens of thousands of interested citizens. The demonstration is an eloquent sermon against war, as well as a representation of the necessary training activity of our citizen soldiery as a component of the national defense.
