"The fight was a great disappointment to me," Jack declared. "Sharkey obviously had all the heat of things up to the time he fouled Schmeling. I hate to see any title awarded on a foul. However, at the present time, I have no intention of trying to regain the crown.

Still Feels Effects of Operation

"In the first place I haven't yet fully recovered from my recent operation and am in no condition to think of fighting. Later on, if my condition improves sufficiently, I might go into light training just to feel myself out. Then if my condition warrants it, I might consider a match with

Schmeling—but it is not likely I will do so.

"At the present time, I am considering a couple of motion picture offers and may accept one or both of them. That would keep me busy for several months and I wouldn't have any time to think of fighting."
