MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18. (AP)—The United States Department of Agriculture, weather bureau, issued its regular weekly crop summary, report, today, which said in part:

CEREALS: Corn is improving under the influence of warmer weather. Wheat would be benefited by rain in places, but is generally doing well, though some fields are very weedy.

FRUITS: Cherries are being marketed in the warmer districts; continued dropping of cherries is reported in western localities. Early strawberries are gone in most places, but there is a good supply of later ones for local markets. Conditions have been favorable for cane fruits. Thinning of apples and pears is progressing rapidly.

MEADOWS: Pastures, and ranges: The second crop of alfalfa is growing well in the milder districts, while in some of the cooler regions cutting of this crop is still in progress. Cutting of clover is making good progress. Unirrigated pastures are drying in southern counties, but are still good in the Willamette Valley and along the coast. Range feed is excellent except over small areas.

LIVE STOCK: Shearing continues in a few places. Most range stock has moved to summer ranges and is doing well. Early lambs are being shipped. Turkeys are doing well.

MISCELLANEOUS: Early potatoes are in market in western localities. Warmer weather has been favorable for truck and melons. Flax, mints and hops are making good growth.

The butter market appears to have recovered some strength. Prices were unchanged today, but the tone indicated no weakening from present values. Supplies are lighter than a few days ago.

Egg prices were barely steady. Fruit and vegetables are showing declines in keeping with the advancing season. Strawberries, however, hold a fairly even tone.

BUTTER: steady, unchanged. Eggs: barely steady, unchanged.

MILK (butterfat), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, wool, nuts, hay, cascara bark and hops steady and unchanged.

SUGAR: steady, (sacked basis) cane, fruit or berry \$4.90 per

cwt. Beet sugar \$4.70 cwt. FLOUR: steady; (city delivery prices) family patents, 49s \$6.80; whole wheat, 49s \$5.90; Graham, 49s \$5.70; Bakers' hard wheat, 49s \$6.20; Bakers' bluestem patents, 49s \$6.60; pastry flour, 49s \$6.30.

CATTLE 150, calves 25; in-between grades and the stock 50c to 1.00 lower. Heifers, 8.75-9.50, common to medium 6.00-8.75. Cows, good 7.50-8.50, common to medium 5.00-7.50, low cutter to cutter 2.50-5.00. Bulls (yearlings excluded) 7.00-7.50, cutter to medium 5.00-7.00.
