## BOXING CARD APPEARS LIKE BANG UP BOUT

### McDonald-Dyson Affair Gives Promise of Great Action

What looks like another bang-up boxing card is on tap for Klamath Falls tomorrow night at the Legion arena. Today is the last day of preparation for all of the principals. Tomorrow, the proverbial morning walk, rub down and afternoon nap and relaxation for the boxers. Some light work will be indicated in the afternoon by the boys who are training here, and that will be the last until they toe the mark tomorrow night, which sends them into battle.

**Trained to the Minute**  
In the top spot between Shrimp McDonald, Lakeview high school boy, and Little Henry Dyson, Klamath Falls favorite, the fans will look at two boys who are trained to the minute, if ever two gladiators were. McDonald will weigh 115, as will Dyson. The Lakeview entry has done his training at home under the eye of his father, and he has had the best of the experience of Charlie Towser, Charlie's brother, who is the boxing game by heart if he is ever going to learn it, for he has been associated with fights and fighters for over twenty years. Shrimp will come into the ring fit and ready.

For the past week Dyson could have been seen on the road, swathed in sweaters, doing his job for the benefit of his wind. He has been accompanied on these early morning jaunts by Joe Rubio, who is also on the card. Benny declares that he has trained as never before for a start in a local ring. This is not by any means the first wind-up for Benny, and he will be free from the usual tension that always accompanies a beginner in his first "big shot."

**Two-Fisted Semi**  
Matchmaker Bickersstaff has certainly lined up a two-fisted semi-windup for this show. None other than the heavy-socking Young Sam Langford against Al Trulmans. Sam needs no introduction to Klamath Falls ringworms, as he has performed creditably here on several occasions, and will have the usual colored following which is always on hand when "Tham" deals his dukes. Trulmans is a product of San Diego, Calif., and is being groomed for some top-line bouts in the south. Al is a youngster, and is not being brought on any too fast. This will be a go between youth on one hand and the old experience on the other—a condition which excites the curiosity of all boxing adherents.

**Rubio Meets Burns**  
The special event brings together Joe Rubio and Bearcat Burns. Joe is the newcomer from San Antonio, Texas, who gave the fans such a run for their money in the last show, in which Joe slugged through four tough rounds with Leo "Battling" Burns, who is a brother of the Bearcat. Joe is bound to enter the ring as a moral favorite because of his swell exhibition in his first start locally. Joe is the kind of a boy the fans want to see in there, because he makes his opponent fight. Not much can be said of Burns as yet, but the mitee like his ever-willing "her Leo, then the radical route will be hoarse when this mitee over. However, the fact that the Bearcat got a draw with Austin Rosander should stamp him as "the goods."

**Valasquez New Fighter**  
Battling Leo Burns, aforementioned brother of Bearcat Burns, meets Art Valasquez, Roseville Junction Spaniard, in another four-round tussle. Leo moved in on Klamath Falls fans by coming from behind and getting a draw with Joe Rubio. He is certainly plenty tough, and while is not so very hard to hit, he is hard to hurt. Rubio can attest to this. Valasquez is making the fifth start of his career against Leo, and it might look to one up a tree that the Roseville boy has picked a tough morsel for his first chewing match, but according to Cy Johnstone, who is experienced in the main, art, and from the words of Earl Morrison, a newcomer who has seen the Valasquez person battle, it will be no soft evening for Mr. Leo "Battling" Burns.

One more four-rounder to raise the curtain will constitute the evening's entertainment. The ticket sale is meeting a fine response, because of the all-round class that this card appears to possess. Mecca, Waldorf and Spar are the spots where the "queets" can be had, and the prices are as usual, 50 cents for kids, \$1.50 and \$2.50.

### Duncan Obtains Delay in Trials

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19. (AP)—Robert Gordon Duncan, charged in a federal indictment with using profane and abusive language over a radio station here, obtained two delays in his case in court today. He was granted until tomorrow to file a demurrer to the indictment, and until Friday to file a motion for change of venue.

Duncan, self-styled "Oregon wildcat and chain-store nemesis", was an unsuccessful candidate for republican nomination to congress. His indictment for violation of federal radio commission regulations followed a series of speeches he made over radio KVEP here, attacking chain stores and a number of Portland men. The license of the radio station was revoked by the federal commission.

## Eastern Clubs Find Going Rougher When They Invade Western Division Territory

To a disinterested observer it would appear the scene of a ball game should not make much difference in the result to such seasoned campaigners as Major League players but it does not always work out that way.

The Eastern National League clubs, just opening their second western tour, found surprising success at home but it is rather doubtful whether they will continue it on the road.

The New York Giants, who routed their intersectional opponents in 12 games at the Polo Grounds, had trouble yesterday in taking their first game of the tour from the Pittsburgh Pirates, who won but four out of 13 away from home.

**Unassisted Double**  
The final count was 4 to 3 for New York, and it took a sparkling unassisted double play by Hughy Critz to end the game before the Pirates had tied the score.

Other National League clubs do not start the second half of the East-West test until today, but on the basis of form shown in the games since June 1, the Eastern clubs have all the advantage. They won 34 contests while the West took but 13, with only the hard fighting Chicago Cubs getting better than a .500 average. Every Eastern club won more games than it lost.

**American Race Closer**  
In the American League, the struggle was somewhat closer as the East's leading pennant contenders held their own although they were pulled down from the heights they had reached before they invaded the western half of the circuit.

The East came out ahead, 26 games to 25, due principally to the New York Yankees, winning nine and losing three. Other Eastern clubs came out just below the .500 mark but their western rivals, with the exception of the Cleveland Indians, were in the same vicinity. Cleveland won eight out of 12 games.

**A Real Champions**  
The Indians, after pushing to

within striking distance of the league lead, found when they came east again yesterday the Philadelphia Athletics have a real championship team despite eight defeats in 14 games.

Cleveland had a chance to oust the World's champions from first place, but even with their pitching ace, Wes Ferrell, could not stop the Athletics in a crucial moment. The A's made a dozen hits, most of them in two big innings, and equalled an American League record for home run hitting in winning a 7 to 2 decision.

Thye had Marshall in trouble several times with his wristlocks in the early part of the match. Marshall weighed 217, Thye 158.

Harry Demetral, Chicago, defeated Farmer Vance, Idaho, in the preliminary, when he took a fall in the fourth round with a reverse bar slam and injured Vance's shoulder so that he could not return.

It was announced Al Karasick and Abe Coleman would headline the card next week for probably the last match of the season.

San Francisco gained yesterday what at this stage of the game amounts to a considerable step in the Pacific Coast league, downing its persistent rival, Los Angeles, 15 to 5, while Sacramento lost to Seattle, 2 to 9. Oakland and Missions, which have been threatening the three leaders, both lost.

A wild second inning saw the Angels drive Millus out of the box and score four runs, only to have the Seals come back in their half to ruin Ballou and Peters, and score nine runs.

**Indians Get Revenge**  
The Indians got revenge for the shutout of the day before when they drove Flynn from the mound in the first inning at the Capital City. Hubbell held the Seals to seven singles while Seattle was adding tallies off Gould and Hamilton.

Oakland errors and misjudged plays were largely responsible for their defeat by Portland, 7 to 5, which evened the series. They knocked Orman out of the box in the eighth to tie the score, but a wild throw to the plate in the ninth led in the winning run.

Hollywood made it two straight from the Missions when Rummeler's home run in the eighth with one on gave them a 6 to 4 victory. The Reds had tied it at four-all in the previous round, but Herman Pilette allowed the Stars one too many extra-base hits.

## State Veterans' Aid Extended to Over \$28,000,000

SALEM, Ore., June 19. (AP)—Of the nearly 12,000 loans that have been made to war veterans under the State Aid act only 486, so far, have been extended to veterans of the Spanish-American war, according to records in the office of the State Aid commission. These aggregate \$1,300,000. An amendment to the act by the 1929 legislature extended the loan privilege, but not bonus payments, to veterans of the Spanish war.

Oregon veterans of the World War who have elected to take bonus payments from the state instead of loans number 22,954, a total of \$5,053,835, an average of \$221 to each beneficiary.

At the end of April loans had been made to a total of 11,776 war veterans, totaling \$28,179,125, of which \$23,372,504.94 is still outstanding.

About 3000 veterans have elected to take loans at some time in the future. These applications aggregate \$7,500,000.

## Triangle Tour to Start July 21st

The Canadian National Railways and Steamship company announce the fifth annual personally conducted all-expense triangle tour, famously known as the triangle tour of British Columbia, embracing a trip of 1250 miles through the most spectacular of the Canadian Rockies and a 550-mile scenic sea voyage along the coast of British Columbia. The fare covers all expenses for ten days from July 21st to July 30th and includes first class transportation in meals, berth, driver and other entertainment.

This was the announcement made yesterday by F. N. McKenzie, traveling passenger agent, who was here from his Portland headquarters.

Arrangements for the tour are being made by representatives of the Canadian National Railways and further plans may be obtained from the local Southern Pacific office or at 302 Yamhill street, Portland.
