Speaks to Reporters
Then, turning to the reporters, he spoke of what his expedition had accomplished in the Antarctic.

First, he said, they had discovered and explored 125,000 square miles of land, existence of which had only been surmised before. They found rock formations indicating great coal deposits, of commercial significance. They photographed miles on miles of ice covered terrain and definitely established the need in Antarctica of a permanent weather station.

All Return Home
The thing for which he was most thankful, he said, was that he had brought all his expedition safely home. "All my men have come back safe," he said feelingly, "for which we must thank providence."

The admiral said he had no future explorations until a \$100,000 debt remaining from his expedition is cleared away. **Pleanty to Explore**
"There's not much left to explore, is there?" he was asked. "Oh, yes," he answered quickly. "There are thousands of miles of unexplored lands in South America and Antarctica and as long as there is land no one has seen, men will continue to seek it."

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sional man in the city is benefited by the county's agriculture. Its prosperity is reflected directly into every ledger and cash register.

Opinion Divided
This plainly means the necessity of centered thought of all on what is best for the district to do. Many believe taking over the physical project and operating by the farmers is the thing; others believe differently.

The meetings in the valley that have been called should be largely attended, not only by water users and land owners, but by business and professional men who are interested in the general prosperity of the county.

A group of landowners and water users of the Klamath irrigation district, Burrill Short, Ira Green, H. E. Wilson, Percy Dixon and S. P. Dehlinger, director of the district board, have called and will hold meetings at Healey on Saturday evening, June 21; at Merrill on Tuesday evening, June 24, and at Malin on Thursday evening, June 26, for the purpose of considering the advisability of taking over the operation of the district from the bureau of reclamation.

These landowners have just returned from a four-day inspection trip over the Truckee-Carson irrigation district of the Newlands, Nevada, federal reclamation project, a trip made for the purpose of obtaining all the practical, first-hand information about the advantages and disadvantages of farmer operation.

The Newlands project was selected for inspection for several reasons. It is the most accessible; it is very nearly comparable with the local district in size, age, altitude, soil, climate, crops and marketing conditions; the proposed contract to be voted on here Saturday, June 28, is modeled on the Newlands contract, many of its paragraphs and most of the disputed ones being identical, word for word, with the Newlands contract. Finally, the Truckee-Carson district has been self-operating since 1926, giving a long enough period of time fairly to compare the results of government operation as against self-operation.

On this inspection trip the delegation talked with the bankers and business men of the towns on the project, with the county assessor, the irrigation district board and with many farmers in the field in an effort to get a well-rounded view of the practical results of district operation.

At the meetings that are called, besides the report of the delegation, it is desired that anyone who has any objection to make to any of the terms of the proposed contract present themselves and publicly state what their objections are. No personal or acrimonious discussions are desired, but any objections to the contract should be presented to the water users where they can be answered if an answer is possible and the facts determined so the result of the election will be for the best interest of the irrigation district.

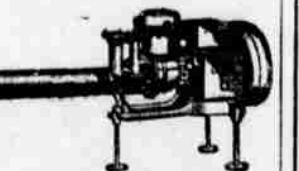
