

MANIAC SLAYER CONTINUES TO THWART POLICE

Several Hundred New
York Officers Fail
to Find Man.

NEW YORK, June 19, (AP)—Several hundred policemen searched the byways of the Boston post road today for evidence of a third murder by the maniac blamed for two killings in Queens within a week.

Search for the mad slayer shifted today to the Eastern Bronx, after an all night vigil in Queens, when a newspaper received a warning in the mail purporting to come from the slayer himself, boasting that he had committed another murder, naming his victim as "Harold Bridenbach" and telling where the body would be found.

Thought Slaying Holdup.
When Joseph Moynski, Queens Delicatessen proprietor, was slain a week ago last night in his motor car, parked beside a secluded road, his death was regarded as the work of a holdup man or a jealous enemy.

But when Noel Sowley, young radio salesman, was killed in a similar manner Monday night, and when the killer escorted the girl who was with him to a transportation line which would take her to her home—just as he had taken to a subway station the young woman in the car with Moynski—and when a note mentioning the Moynski murder was found in the car beside Sowley's body, police agreed that both killings were the work of the same man, apparently a maniac.

Gives Body's Location.
This conclusion was supported by a letter to New York newspaper, received, it said, before the actual finding of Sowley's body, announcing the killing and telling where the body would be found.

The killer warned in his letters that he would again strike last night in College Point, Queens, and six hundred policemen blanketed the district in a search for him, but while they still scoured the vicinity early today another letter, purporting to come from the same source, reached the newspaper.

It said the killing had been done, but along the Boston Post road in the Bronx, across Long Island sound from the borough of Queens.

"Find the Woman"
"Where is XSW-9? He is already dead. He is on the Boston Post road. His name is Harold Bridenbach. Find the woman, old man, and you've got me."

This not caused police commissioner Mahoney to shift his search to the Bronx, where an all-morning hunt had failed today to reveal a corpse or any sign of a killing.

LIASON DIVULGED

CHICAGO, June 19, (AP)—Evidence of a liaison between Alfred "Jack" Lingie and a reputed espionage gunman was given to a criminal court jury today.

Testifying at the trial of Tony "Red" Kissane for carrying a pistol, Detective William Barry quoted the gangster as protesting when arrested: "Nix, I'm working for Jack Lingie."

This was the first evidence divulged concerning the slain newspaperman's alleged relations with gangland, relations acknowledged as "sinister rumors," by the Tribune in an editorial this morning.

Torrence has his greatest opportunity since the advent of talking pictures in "Officer O'Brien," a Pathe picture starring William Boyd, in which he plays a humorous old crook and the father of Boyd, and which can be seen and heard at the Pelican theatre now. Others in the cast are Dorothy Sebastian, Clyde Cook, Arthur Housman, Russell Gleason, Paul Hurst, Hal Harolds, Tom Mahoney and Toya Fujita.
