They had the fight bugs on their feet all during the flashing bout, and at the finish the "pumps" had only one thing to do—call it a draw. By popular demand they were re-matched, and it was for a main go, too. They certainly deserve it. It is their first start in the select circle, and there will be no disappointment in the showing these two wildcats will make. They both scale 118 pounds.

That Semi-Final

The semi-final wind-up six rounds, welterweights, could be put on top, for it surely is a main event itself. Tex is showing for the first time here Al Trulmans of San Diego, a likely-looking youngster. This boxer has had 42 fights, and has lost only one decision. His manager, Dick Dillard, of Southern California, is grooming this chap for a shot at the championship, and is taking him along slowly, and will not permit him to take a match longer than six rounds. Some of the boys that Al has defeated are Joe Schaff, Sy Schaffer, Eddie Gorman, Kid Koppke, Young Gonzalez, Buzz-Saw Burnett, Johnny Woods, Guy McKenny, Eddie Benson, Sammy Bernatein, and a host of others. Romero Lemon, the flashy Mexican of Southern California is the only boxer to hold a decision over Al, and this Mexican is a head-biter down south, he having beaten Young Harry Willis, Chas. Cobb, Jack Sparr and others. This Trulmans also won the far-western amateur lightweight championship in San Francisco, and was runner-up in west coast try-outs. He is a crack boxer and is bound to make "Tham" step his best.

Sam in Shape

The "Black Ball" is in great shape and Manager Archie Rice is confident that Sam will take this Trulmans. He says Sam is hitting harder than ever, and wouldn't be surprised if his newly acquired charge stops Al. It certainly will be a match that will please.

STRIBLING AND VON PORAT TO MEET TONIGHT

Both Fighters Eager to Wrest Crown From Max Schmeling.

CHICAGO, June 20. (AP)—The battle of postponements between Otto Von Porat and W. L. (Young) Stribling will become a leather-throwing reality in the Chicago stadium tonight.

After several days of anxiety for stadium officials over the condition of Stribling's flighty left hand, only the weighing-in remained to be accomplished before the Southerner and the Norwegian crusher climb into the ring after two postponements, for not more than 10 rounds, and possibly less.

Shift Weighing Time

The official weighing ceremony time was shifted from 2 p. m. to 1:15 p. m., the change having been made, the Illinois State Athletic Commission announced, to "avoid confusion."

Von Porat was expected to come in at 205 pounds, giving him a sizeable advantage over Stribling who will weigh about 190.

The postponement from Wednesday night to tonight, granted Stribling because of troubles with his left hand, apparently had not damaged box office affairs.

Big House Expected

Cleveland Baker Complete Master Of Spanish Pug

DETROIT, June 20. (AP)—Johnny Risko, the Cleveland baker boy, has conclusively demonstrated he is Paulino Urcidun's master in the ring.

These two veteran trial horses clashed before 11,000 fans in Navin Field last night and Risko left hooked his way to a decisive victory in ten rounds. Ringside experts credited the Clevelander with nine of the ten rounds.

First Victory Doubtful

In their first meeting, three years ago, Risko was awarded the decision after a close fight that some critics thought Paulino had won.

Risko, throwing punches from any posture in which he might find himself, cut the Basque woodchopper all around the ring had him bleeding almost from the start, staggered him badly with a series of hard rights and lefts in the fifth round. He nearly closed Paulino's left eye and cut the other one badly, and at the end was swinging punches just as freely as he had in the first round.

There were no knockdowns. Risko weighed 159 3/4; Paulino 155 1/2.

Athletics Emerge From Run Of Hard Luck and Display Regular Championship Form

It is a matter of indisputable record that the Philadelphia A's are current champions of the baseball world, and their games of the past few days go a long way toward explaining why they hold that position.

The Athletics were in a bad spot for a while. Crippled by a series of injuries, they saw the Cleveland Indians take first place away from them and lose it again before the onslaught of the New York Yankees.

They came home from a disastrous tour of the West faced by the double threat from these teams, with Washington not far in the background, and with a five game series with Cleveland to start their home stay.

Cleveland Drops Two

The champions began to display their championship calibre Wednesday, and repeated the dose yesterday by a 4 to 2 count, sending Cleveland down into fourth place by the two defeats.

The Yankee threat would not be shaken off, although the New Yorkers had to bring in Babe Ruth's famous home run act to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 5 to 4.

After fanning in three attempts the Babe clouted his 22nd homer of the year in the seventh inning, and provided the margin of victory.

New Players Help

Washington, holding its tie in games with the Yankees for second place, found its newly acquired players a great help in scoring a 3 to 1 victory over the Chicago White Sox. Al Crowder, formerly of St. Louis, held the Sox to four hits. The Great Shires gave his old mates a taste of his batting greatness by hitting three times in four trips to the plate.

Dandy MacFayden was the one star in the fourth American league game. He held the Browns to three hits while Boston won its fourth straight game, 4 to 1.

Weather Blocks National

Only two National league contests escaped the weather in the West, and the result of that pair was to bring the Chicago Cubs a

game closed to the Brooklyn Robins, the league's floundering leaders.

The Cubs opened a home run assault on Socks Seibold in the first three innings, and scored all their runs for a 10 to 4 triumph. Hack Wilson hit his 19th four-bagger, tying Chuck Klein for the league leadership, while Woody English and Kiki Cuyler also hit homers in those three big frames.

The Robins failed to offer much support to Adolfo Luque, and the Cuban veteran was ousted from his post as pitching leader of the league with a 5-0 defeat at the hands of the cellar-occupying Cincinnati Reds. The defeat left Brooklyn 2 1/2 games ahead of Chicago.
