Weed Control an Important Question on Klamath Farms

Various Perennial Weeds Have Been Found During Past Five Years and, in Irrigated Districts, Spread in Some Cases Has Been Rapid.

Weed control is one of the most important questions facing the farmers of Klamath county at this time. Various perennial weeds have been found in the county during the last five or six years and, in the irrigated districts, spread in some cases has been very rapid. Weeds in the canal and ditch banks are the main sources of much spreading.

Perhaps the worst weed to all is what is known as White Top or Hoary Cress. Most farmers are still unfamiliar with it and as a result a small patch is not given attention until after it has spread over a considerable area. It is a perennial weed and spreads both from the root stock and from seed. In some districts it is appearing in alfalfa fields and when the alfalfa is cut for hay the White Top seed is mature enough and spreads extremely rapidly by this means. One case was noted a few days ago where hay had been hauled and fed in a corral a few years ago. At the present time the corral is a solid mass of White Top but, being under dry land conditions, it has not spread very far outside this particular feed lot.

Control Measures Costly—This weed is particularly serious in certain parts of Eastern Oregon and Idaho and some control has been secured by use of sodium chlorate and atrazine sprays. Some trials have been carried out by the county agent's office in Klamath county for the past two years but as yet control measures are not satisfactory. Where heavy applications of spray was made, killings have been secured, but the cost is so heavy that it is not practical on large areas. However, anyone finding a small patch on his property can destroy it by heavy and continued use of either of the above sprays. Every farmer should be familiar with this weed in particular in order to check its place thoroughly to see whether or not any has started. This should not be neglected as control over heavily infested places will cost thousands of dollars.

Lone Pine Badly Infested—At the present time infestation in Klamath county is centered in the Lone Pine district. A crop of White Top can be observed from the highway on the Lyle Merrill place about four-

teen miles south of Klamath Falls on the Merrill highway. It will be observed that spread has been very rapid there during the past three or four years. In that district this weed is a very serious problem.

Experimental work has been carried on in Siskiyou county for several years on this weed, both diesel and fuel oil being used in order to prevent seeding. These oils will not kill the plant but will prevent seeding that year. Atrazine and sodium chlorate sprays have been used there and some control is now being secured. However, results are not sufficiently satisfactory to enable them to start a general clean-up. The sprays have been used on the smaller patches and not on the large areas and as a result the heavily infested ranches are in such condition that profitable farming can not be carried out in a general way. However, spread has been prevented by the annual use of oil sprays. Farmers in Klamath county can well profit by the experience gained in other sections in the control of this weed.

To Oil Ditch Banks—It is planned to use oil in Klamath county this year on ditch and canal banks in order to prevent the spreading of further trials on different spray methods will be continued and small patches will be cleaned up by the use of heavy spray applications. Active weed control work will start next week. While we have other serious weeds such as Canadian Thistle, Wild Morning Glory, Spiny and

American Cocklebur and Bull Thistle, never the less control of these weeds is comparatively easy when compared to White Top. Local demonstrations have proved that Wild Morning Glory can be controlled by use of either atrazine or sodium chlorate, and a reasonable percentage of control of Canadian Thistle has also been secured.

Kelley Addresses Rotarians Today

Mr. Kelley declared that the completion of the new airport would make Klamath Falls one of the most important stops in the airway system. He reviewed the progress and improvements made at the field, showing maps and giving the number of take-offs, length of the runways, as well as plans and specifications for hangars. 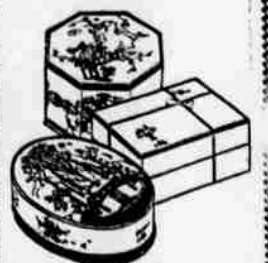
