

WHITNEY SAYS OLMSTEAD LIES ABOUT FUNDS

Merely Seeking Pardon
According to Dry
Administrator.

SEATTLE, June 20, (AP).—"If McKinney took money from the Olmstead fund, God help him," was former United States Attorney Thomas P. Reville's comment on the statement made yesterday in San Francisco by Roy Olmstead, imprisoned run harem, that he had contributed \$3000 to Reville's campaign fund for governor in 1924.

The statement was made at the hearing on the government application to remove Clifford T. McKinney, former assistant United States attorney under Reville, to Seattle for trial, on charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition act. Olmstead said the money was paid to McKinney as "government insurance" against interference in his liquor running enterprises for the campaign fund.

Not in Business

"If McKinney was writing government insurance or any other kind of insurance, that's his business," Reville said. "I am not in the insurance business."

He refused to comment further. In an official statement filed after his defeat for the republican gubernatorial nomination, Reville listed his campaign expenses as \$2,946.98, with the comment: "If I had had more money I would have spent more."

Olmstead Called Liar

McKinney was indicted with Prohibition Administrator Roy C. Lyle, his assistant, William M. Whitney and two agents, Whitney, when informed of Olmstead's statement, declared:

"Olmstead is a liar, and he knows he's a liar. That is probably the price he is willing to pay for the pardon he thinks he will get. His testimony in another trial contradicts what he said in San Francisco. He must have forgotten that."

Circuit Court Pays Respects to Joseph

Honor was paid to the memory of the late George W. Joseph, Portland attorney and republican nominee for governor, Thursday at 2 p. m., by the bench and bar of Klamath county and the citizens who were in the court room.

Judge William Duncan halted court and D. E. Fletcher, well known attorney of this city, in a brief talk paid honor to the late Mr. Joseph.

"This is the time of the interment of the one-time barefoot boy of Lake county which took in Klamath county (later Klamath county was cut off) of an orphaned boy who forced his way through life. He suffered many trials and tribulations to educate himself. He became a leading attorney. He became a statesman—one of the greatest in the west," Mr. Fletcher stated.

"He became the republican party's candidate for governor, which shows the extreme and implicit confidence and regard by the people of this state for the man."

"I feel, your honor, at this time in honor of that man and in respect for the work which he has done, it is befitting that the bench and bar in Klamath county bow their heads in respect and regard for one of our members who has been taken away. I further ask that the clerk of this court spread upon the journal a resolution of regret and honor by the bench, the bar and the citizens assembled here, and that a copy of the resolution be sent to the widow and to George W. Joseph, Jr., in Portland, Oregon." Mr. Fletcher concluded. The court ordered the request followed out.
