

DENNIS ADMITS FORGING NAMES

Petition Circulator in Jail at Portland as Result of Work.

PORTLAND, June 20, (AP)—Robert E. Dennis, 31, a petition circulator, who had been employed by the Oregon State Grange to circulate initiative petitions for the "People's Water and Power Utility District Constitutional Amendment," was in the county jail today charged with violating the state election laws by writing a name other than his own on an initiative petition.

Dennis was arrested by county authorities yesterday as he stepped into the office of R. E. L. Julian, who had been employing him to circulate the petition.

Altered Own Name
Dennis' arrest followed discovery yesterday by James W. Gleason, chief register in the county clerk's office, of apparent forgeries and signatures on three "books" submitted by Dennis. On the petition Dennis had signed his name as R. E. Dennis and gave a different address.

Makes Confession
The district attorney said Dennis made a complete confession following his arrest. The case will be presented to the grand jury, the district attorney said, and the statements Dennis is alleged to have made that he forged more than 300 names to the petition would be submitted as evidence.

Dennis told the district attorney, according to authorities, that he needed money, had been out of work several months, and saw an opportunity to make "a little money" by boosting the names on the petition.

Passer-by Foils Theatre Robbery

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, June 20 (AP)—Butter and egg prices remained unchanged today, but both displayed a weak undertone. The strength shown by butter for the last few days appears to have yielded to accumulating supplies. Eggs values were reported to have been shaded by some dealers, but the co-operatives, who control about 60 per cent of the output, announced no changes.

Poultry prices have declined materially, while fresh meats, with the exception of lamb, have advanced. Poultry yards are being culled and most of the culls are reaching the consuming markets.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"Strawberry supplies were lighter today, and sold 25c per crate higher. Oregon's main strawberry season will be completed by the end of this week, although smaller movement will continue for some time yet.

"Carloads of green peas are selling readily to cash buyers at \$2.24 per crate, depending on trifle weaker today, but still trifle weaker today, but still eastern shipments from Portland grossed financial returns of \$5,000. In addition, many peas are being shipped daily by motor truck to northwest points.

"Yakima reported storage holdings of potatoes totaling 55-60 cars, early this week. Nearly 30 cars have been loaded from that state during the first three days of the week, of which only 4 or 5 cars were new potatoes. The Yakima Netted Gem market is dull, present loadings of combination grade selling at \$5.50 per ton.

"Walla Walla onions will move in a few days, but no orders have been placed by Portland distributors yet, due to liberal supplies and low prices of California onions.

"The bunched vegetables declined to about 30c per dozen, under pressure of heavy supplies."

The "universal pleasure at your successful flight over the south pole" was expressed in that message to the frigid regions. With a warm noonday sun on the White House lawn, the president added the hand clasp of fellowship.

Mr. Hoover, who radioed to Little America the people back home were "glad of proof that the spirit of great adventure still lives," was looking forward to presenting Rear Admiral Byrd tonight with a special gold medal of the National Geographic society which commemorates the aerial dash to the south pole.
