

JONES ANNEXES BRITISH OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

**American Ace Takes Title
For Third Time With
Score of 291.**

MOYLAKE, England, June 20. (AP)—Bobby Jones today won the British open golf championship for the third time with a score of 291.

The open champion of the United States increased his golf titles to three as he won the amateur championship of Great Britain last month. He is the first man to hold the British amateur and open championships since John Ball accomplished the feat in 1899.

Two Shaky Rounds
The Georgian won in spite of two shaky rounds today. He took 74 strokes in the third round, when he carded a six, and 75 in the afternoon when he had a seven on his card. His first two rounds of 70 and 72 pulled him through.

Leo Diegel and Archie Compton threatened until Compton ruined his chances with 43 strokes for the first nine in the afternoon and Diegel remained in the hunt until the sixteenth hole when he took a six.

NORBIAD WILL NOT COMMENT

SALEM, Ore., June 20. (AP)—Governor Norblad returned to Salem today after a three-weeks' trip to eastern cities in the United States and Canada. He declined to comment on the present political situation in Oregon, caused by the death of George Joseph, Republican nominee for governor. Norblad is considered a candidate for nomination by the state central committee, but he refused to talk about his intentions.

Business Poor.
Norblad said he found business conditions poor in the eastern states. He was accorded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws at the University of Chicago, his alma mater, where he gave the graduation address at the College of Law. The Governor will leave this afternoon for Camp Clatsop.

At the executive office he relieved Ralph S. Hamilton of Bend, who as Speaker of the House, has been acting governor during Norblad's absence.

**Kenwood Mill at
Portland Burns**

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20. (AP)—A heap of smoldering embers and twisted iron was all that was left of the Kenwood Lumber company mill, today after a fire which caused loss estimated by J. D. Harvey, president, at \$70,000, only about half covered by insurance.

Only the office and part of the dock on Columbia Street were saved. They were separated from the main buildings of the plant.

Fire was still eating into dock foundations at 8 a. m. and several pieces of fire fighting apparatus were working to extinguish that blaze and what fire remained on the mill site.
