DYSON LOSES TO LAKEVIEW STAR BY NOD

McDonald's Head Proves Undoing of Local Fan Favorite.

Shrimp McDonald gained a decision over Benny Dyson in the ten round main event of what proved to be one of Joe Rickerstaff's best fight cards at the Lexion pavilion last night. Shrimp's victory might be attributed to head work. He used his noodle, head, or whatever it is in two ways—and quite effectively after several hard rounds, in which Dyson was the aggressor, the Lakeview boy got his head into action and succeeded in dazing Benny with a few hard bumps and from there on out the fight was McDonald's. Whether this style of fighting is a matter of discussion here, but it has the desired result—the weakening of the opponent's resistance.

Dyson's Eye Closed

After several rounds of hard jabbing with his left (and here McDonald used his head like a good fighter) Shrimp succeeded in closing Dyson's eye. That eye is Benny's weakness and once his opponent gets to working on that member the Boston boy begins to lose ground.

The first fight looked like Dyson. Although knocked down once, he came back like a wildcat and all but put the Lakeview boy out. Following that flashy round, Dyson took the greater part of the punishment, for, being half blinded, many of his harder blows found Benny did swipe Shrimp's eye in a later round and opened up a small cut from which the local boy was too busy wiping the blood from his own face to pay them proper attention to his antagonist.

To the casual observer it looked like a draw would not have been too unpopular, although there is no room for complaint about the decision handed down by the two judges and referee.

Winner Challenged

Kid Rydler, on time Klamath idol, challenged the winner. The kid has put up some wonderful fights and in condition could still show some of the boys plenty.

Al Trulmans from down below, who came up here to fight "Tham" looks awfully good and appears to be a smart fighter and knows how to hit. He found that Sam Langford was not to be chased out of the ring and the fight turned into one hot battle until, in the fourth round, when Mr. Trulmans, 145, hit Langford, 145, low and the doctor gave the fight to Sam on a foul after scotching Sam to the dressing room for an examination.

Foul Soon Plainly

The foul blow was as plain as day and when it hit could be heard all over the house. The referee should have hesitated in giving the fight to the black boy. Sam sunk to the canvas but was not in the excruciating pain that most low blows cause and this might have led Dick Reed to believe the colored boy was faking the foul.

Sam fought in his queer style and no doubt this bothered the boy from the south. However, the reason for the foul was that Sam looked fat around the waist and Al thought one sunk in there would put the fight on the mat but that boy can take them in that fat tummy, and how.

Trulmans Applauded

It was the first time that the writer has ever seen a man, losing by a foul, get such an ovation when he left the ring. The fans told him last night, by their applause, that they would like to see this new find, Al, in the ring again and they would take him in the top spot. Al and Sam slugged and fought like a couple of mad bulls and in a return to they would do it all over again. Every fan that saw that fight would come back and would recommend it to his friends.

The battle of the night in the four rounders was the opener between Betting Burns and Al Valaska, Beatt, and Roseville, respectively. These boys fought so hard for four rounds that they had to be helped from the ring by their seconds. In the second Valaska was nearly out and in the third it was the Indian boy who was on the verge of a knockout. The house went wild and gave these prelim boys a great hand.

In the next four rounder Bearcat Burns and Rubyo fought a draw at the same weight, 135, but not nearly as fast or hard as the first fight. Rubyo can fight but he gets all tired out running so much and when it isn't necessary. Burns is tough and can take them and when he hit Rubyo he followed until Rubyo got away or tied him up.

Willie Feldman is in hard training with a desire to put himself in the best possible shape. He is developing his lungs by announcing the fights and he does it like big time.

The card was very good and Shrimp and Benny drew a big house and every fan should have been well pleased by the fights the boys gave them.

William Stribling's Murderous Left Fist Propels Norwegian Out of Championship Picture

BY WILLIAM WEEKES Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, June 21 (AP)—The angular figure of Otto Von Porat, Norway's heavyweight contribution today was out of the championship scheme—propelled there by the left fist of William Stribling of Georgia, U. S. A.

Two minutes and fifty seconds after they crawled into the ring at the Chicago stadium last night, Von Porat, the Paralyzer, was stretched paralyzed on the floor, by the same left hand that caused Stribling to ask postponement of the battle.

Fought Real Fight

The ex-schoolboy from Macon, Ga., fighting in a fashion that amazed a throng of around 21,000 persons, carried Von Porat off his feet from the start. None of the holding and mauling that has characterized previous Stribling engagements, were on display.

Stribling came out using everything and it was a thoroughly bewildered Von Porat who launched a right swing at Stribling's jaw—and ran into a left hook that dropped him like a rock.

Von Porat's head struck the canvas with a thud, and what the blow to his chin might have failed to accomplish, was finished when his head struck the floor.

Heart Blow Hurt

Stribling was all over Otto from the start. His left chunked into Von Porat's face with keen precision and a rousing right hand under the Norwegian's heart must

have given him an idea what was coming.

Stribling not only battered Von Porat out of the heavyweight picture, but looped into the center of it. His might have eliminated Von Porat by pouncing out a decision in the well known Stribling fashion.

Instead, he was the killer—a pleasant-faced, laughing killer. Everything he did was impressive.

Blow At Fight

Unofficial figures on the box office angle indicated the fight had created a new indoor attraction for boxing. Around 21,000 spectators paid more than \$80,000 to watch the stunning exhibition of what Stribling can do when he wishes.

The end came so abruptly that the crowd stood speechless. Stribling ran out of his far corner, asstating Von Porat to his stool, then laughed a few words into a radio microphone. Then he ran to "Pa" Stribling, his father-manager, and embraced him.

Stribling had caused postponement of the fight from Wednesday night to last night, pleading an injury to his left hand. An Illinois state athletic commission physician failed to find evidence of injury and Stribling was allowed to go through with the bout.

Any ailment in his left was swiftly transferred to Von Porat's chin, and William has something more to mention when he goes after a shot at the world heavyweight championship.

SCHMELING TO MEET SHARKEY IN SEPTEMBER

NEW YORK, June 21, (AP)—Apparently not satisfied with his questionable world's heavyweight boxing title, Max Schmeling has agreed to meet Jack Sharkey in a return bout at Yankee stadium in September under certain provisions.

Before he steps into the ring again against the man who gave him the championship on a foul in the fourth round, Schmeling says he must have an outright release from Arthur Hueslow, German manager whom he disposed of over a year ago, but whose contract does not expire until October.

Dislikes McNamee

The German heavyweight also says "he will have no part of Graham McNamee as a radio announcer" on grounds the National Broadcasting Company's announcer was partial to Sharkey and made errors in their June 12 bout at the stadium.

As the Garden agreed to take care of the Hueslow settlement as well as finding a suitable broadcaster, there appears no reason why the heavyweight title will not be at stake once more.

Follows Commission's Advice

The proclamation of Schmeling, coming through Joe Jacobs, his manager of choice, follows close upon the New York state athletic commission's advice that Schmeling give Sharkey another bout before the end of the summer.

The state commission recognized the German as champion at its meeting Tuesday. Sharkey has already informed the commission he is willing to meet Maxe again in almost any terms.
