Over 28,000 People Visit Crater Lake So Far This Year

During the first ten days of June 5,500 visitors reached Crater Lake over the excellent highway from Medford and Klamath Falls. This makes a total of 28,506 visitors to Crater Lake National Park during the 1930 travel year, as against 7,679 visitors this date in 1929, or 370 per cent increase in travel over last year.

In past years the park highways were open to travel only after the heavy snow had melted away sufficiently to permit removal by hand labor. This year with the use of new modern snow removal equipment, these highways were opened to travel two months earlier than in 1929, with pronounced decrease in snow removal costs.

By this early opening of the park highways thousands of tourists who travel through southern Oregon during May and June are able to reach the rim of Crater Lake. During the first ten days of June, 1,115 automobiles were driven over these roads, among which were included cars from thirty-two states and three provinces of Canada.
