Judge Balentine Heads state Movement For Old Age Pension Law Sponsored and Directed by Fraternal Order of Eagles

Newly elected state president of the Fraternal Order of Eagles is a member of the Klamath Falls Aerle.

The Fraternal Order of Eagles of Klamath Falls is joining wholeheartedly in the state-wide movement of that order to bring before the people and the coming legislature the need of an old age pension law in Oregon.

That it is in line with progress and is bound to come sooner or later is argued by Walter E. Perkins, secretary of the Klamath Eagles, and state president of the order. He insists that such a law is economically sound and will use the public monies now expended for charities and the poor house maintenance in a much more effective manner, at the same time giving to unfortunate humanity a ray of hope and a cheerfulness that are both humane and right.

Balentine State Chairman
U. S. Balentine, of Klamath Falls, is state chairman of the state-wide old age committee, and he is planning a trip to the legislature at Salem this coming winter to place before that body either a bill of his own or join with Representative Jimmie Mott of Marion on his old age pension bill.

The state meeting of the Eagles at Eugene a short time ago brought pressure on every lodge to become active in support of the bill which will be introduced. Flanking resolutions were passed by the gathering in support of the movement and every lodge in the state was instructed to interview its legislative delegation.

12 States Have Law
It is claimed that 12 states now have such a law, California being the latest state to join the column with an old age pension statute. The California law is said to be patterned after the New York state law and is considered a model to follow.

Back in 1912 Theodore Roosevelt went on record for the old age pension law. He said: "It is

abnormal for industry to throw back upon the community the human wreckage due to wear and tear, sickness and involuntary unemployment."

Estimate Four Million
A survey estimates that there are four million aged persons, 45 years or older, in the United States. One out of every five is a pauper, and one in three is said to be dependent.

The changing era of civilization is blamed as much as anything else by those who have studied the question. They declare the modern machine age makes it necessary for men to retire from their life jobs sooner. They also spend more to fulfill the higher standards and more to educate their children. The greater expense makes it harder for workers to provide savings to care for them in their old age, it is asserted.

With Lodge Principles
The Fraternal Order of Eagles is founded on the principles of liberty, truth, justice and equality and favor allowing all people to follow the "pursuit of happiness."

"All that is needed in any state to secure enactment of a law providing old age pensions is an enlightened and awakened public opinion," literature distributed to four million Eagles and thousands of others, states.

The various investigations made have found that the average per capita cost of keeping the poor in a poorhouse is \$244 a year while it is figured that \$300 a year is sufficient under the old age pension system.

Law Qualified
It is further argued that one-third of those over 60 years of age own their own homes and some old age pension laws provide that when a claimant dies the property is to be sold and the state repaid.

Residence, character and age qualifications are also included in most of the laws.

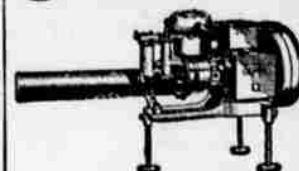
Returned Home

ESSENTIAL FOODS SHOULD BE SEASONED TO PLEASE TASTE

Science of Cooking Calls For Knowledge of Developing Flavor
