

ATLANTIC CITY MAYOR KILLED IN CAR WRECK

Express Train Strikes
Loaded Automobile
at Crossing.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 23. (AP)—Mayor Anthony M. Huffa, Jr., of Atlantic City, and three other persons were killed today when an automobile was struck by a shore-bound Philadelphia-Atlantic City express on a grade crossing here.

Huffa, who was 52, was identified by papers in his pocket. The other dead are: John Wiley, 52, his wife, Lillian, 49, of Ventnor, and Margaret C. Strause, 37, of Ventnor, widow of Stephen Strause, a brother of Mayor Huffa's wife.

Bodies Badly Mangled
The automobile, Mayor Huffa's car, was struck squarely in the center by the southbound Pennsylvania railroad train. The wreckage was strewn over the tracks for more than 100 yards, and the bodies so mangled that identification was almost impossible.

So terrific was the crash that the engine of the flyer was disabled, and it was necessary to send another engine from Atlantic City to draw the train into the station.

Assemblyman Anthony J. Strause, of Atlantic City, nephew of Mayor Huffa, was at first believed one of the victims.

Political Leader
Mayor Huffa, reputed to be extremely wealthy, was a powerful political figure at the shore resort, where there have been several efforts to oust him. He had just finished a short rest he took after being acquitted by an Atlantic county petit jury on charges of illegal practices in connection with the placing of the Municipal Insurance.

Ten horses, owned by members of the Portland Hunt club, were Saturday entered in the racing meet to be run here July 3, 4, 5, 6, during the "Days of '49" celebration, and two more racers were entered from Salem, it was announced last night by R. E. Bradbury, chairman of the racing committee.

It was also announced last night that Tom Armstrong, track manager, had been dismissed by the racing committee and a new track manager will be hired today at a meeting of the racing committee at the Elks temple at 10 a. m.

The entries yesterday increased the number of horses already entered to nearly 75, and it is now certain that the race meet here at celebration time will be one of the largest to be held in the northwest this year.

Many horses are already at the barns at the fair grounds, and some have been training their racers for nearly a month for the meet.

NEW YORK, June 23. (AP)—A man in woman's clothing was sought today as police began the second week of their search for the mad slayer of two men in Queens.

Meanwhile a Brooklyn newspaper distributor, Meyer Newmark, received a letter threatening his death unless he returned document "U. J. 4-2-44." This, the ninth letter purporting to have come from the maniac, followed an alleged announcement Saturday that his mission of death was ended and that he was returning to Russia. Police were uncertain as to the authenticity of either letter.

The theory that the maniac has donned woman's clothing to elude the police was advanced today after Mark E. Brown, Manhattan reporter, reported that a person at first thought to have been a woman, accosted him and his family as they were eating a picnic lunch in Queens yesterday, and asked for a ride to New York.

They invited the "woman" to lunch with them, Brown said, but as their guest took leave, they noticed trousers under the skirt.

Fire Permits and Smoking Ban Are Put Into Effect

Camp fire permits are required on the Grater National Forest and beginning Saturday, June 21. These are free and may be obtained from the Forest Supervisor's office on the third floor of the Post Office building at Medford, or from any forest officer. At the following improved camp grounds permits are not required:

Bridge, Brown's Cabin, Brown's Cabin Bridge, Rybo Creek, Gaitie Creek, Copeland, Grater Creek, Crystal Springs, Dead Indian Soda Springs, Parwell Bend, Foster Bridge, Rogue River, Hamaker R. S. camp, Huckleberry, Hurryon, Lake of the Woods, 3 camps, Mazama Spring, Mazama, Middlefork Applegate Bridge, Minnehaha, National Creek, Natural Bridge, Odessa, Recreation, Rogue River, Seven Mile, Silver Camp, Union Creek, Wagon, Warpage, Whiskey, Wild Cat, Woodruff Meadows, Woodruff Meadows Bridge.

Effective July 1, smoking is restricted on National Forest land by the following regulation:

"Except on paved or surfaced highways, smoking on lands of the United States within the National Forests of Oregon and Washington is prohibited while traveling in timber, brush or grass areas from July 1 until the close of the fire season as declared by the Regional Forester, but not later than September 30."

New Main Line Motor Equipment Goes In Service

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23. (Special)—Eighty new, modern, deluxe motorcoaches, recently received by Pacific Greyhound Lines, were today placed in service for the accommodation of summer travelers.

According to L. D. Jones, general manager of Pacific Greyhound Lines, all equipment on main lines of the motorcoach company is now being replaced with new coaches.

The old main line equipment, after thorough renovation and reconstruction, will be used to replace present equipment on feeder lines and local services.

"These new motorcoaches represent the last word in modern highway transportation comfort," Jones said. "They are part of a total order of 185 new motorcoaches placed with General Motors and C. H. Wilt Corporation. Each has a capacity of 35 passengers and are so designed as to afford the utmost in luxurious motorcoach travel."

Allocation of the new equipment, according to Jones, will place 26 new coaches on the San Francisco-Portland services; 18 will operate between San Francisco and Los Angeles on the valley route; 16 have been assigned to the San Francisco-Los Angeles-San Diego service on the coast route and the Malibu highway; 14 will ply between Los Angeles and San Diego and on other services and the balance will be used on San Francisco-Stockton routes and other services operating out of the San Francisco bay region.

Oregon Robbers Caught In Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, June 23. (AP)—Police announced yesterday that Earl J. Hobson, 30, and T. B. Wise, 30, held in the city jail here following their confession of a motorcycle patrolman preceding a wild ride through ten northern Utah cities Saturday night during which they committed three robberies, have admitted three other offenses since they came here from Portland, Ore., Friday.

Information received here from Portland police stated that the men were well known to the police there. They admitted serving terms in the Oregon state penitentiary for robbery last year.

Did Time In Oregon

SALEM, Ore., June 23. (AP)—Earl J. Hobson and T. B. Wise, in jail at Salt Lake after shooting an officer and committing a series of robberies were both released from the Oregon state penitentiary less than a year ago where they did time for robbery.

Hobson served six years and eight months on conviction in Portland for assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon. He was released in September, 1929. Wise and a partner named Anderson were convicted of robbing the Birdie's roadhouse near Portland in 1924 and were released in December, 1929. Both previously did time at Walla Walla.

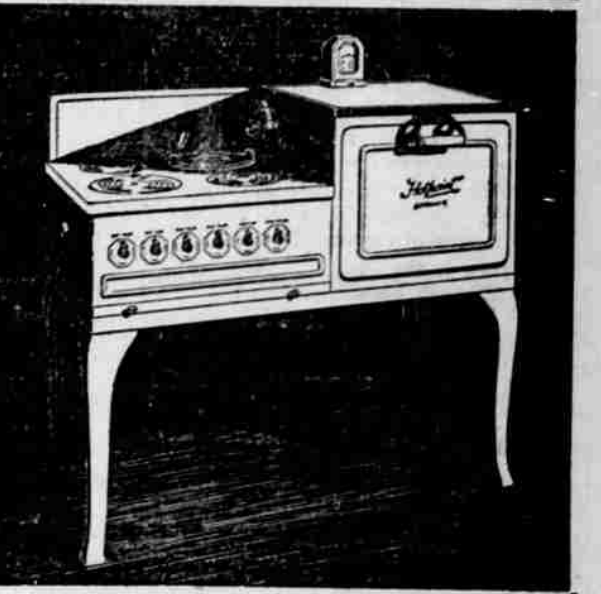
