FOUR PACIFIC COAST TEAMS IN TIGHT RACE

Sacramento's Two-Game Lead Over Angels in Constant Danger.

Pacific coast league fans looked forward to some hot campaigning today as four teams went into the final three weeks of the first half of the season closely bunched.

Events to date indicated little prospect for any decided shifting of the standings, but possibilities of last minute bursts of speed over its closest competitor, Los Angeles, look rather slim.

Withstand Oaks Threat

The Senators withstood a prolonged threat by Oakland in which the A's for several days stood only half a game behind. San Francisco and then Los Angeles succeeded the Oaks as the chief contenders, and Carl Zamo's east bay team, by taking 6 out of 7 games from Portland last week, gave promise of taking another turn.

The Oaks set out for San Francisco to face the Mission for the first time in the season. They prepared to meet some of the heaviest hitting in the circuit, as like Boone continued to hold the batting lead as well as premier home run honors.

Monroe Third in Homers

Monroe of the Reds stood third in homers and Rosenberg fourth in batting. The latter was shoved out of second place by Schulmerich of Los Angeles, and Sherry of San Francisco also passed him up.

The Seals took further notice as hitters with the ranking of Wingo as second in home runs. Killie's men and the Angels invaded the northwest today for alternate series with Seattle and Portland scheduled to occupy them for the remainder of the first period.

Games today: Oakland at Mission, San Francisco at Portland, Los Angeles at Seattle, Sacramento at Hollywood.

GODFREY LOSES BOXING RIGHTS

PHILADELPHIA, June 24 (AP)—George Godfrey, the giant negro, who last night fouled Primo Carnera, the ambulant Alp, in the fifth round, today lost his license as a boxer.

In addition to revoking his license permanently, the Pennsylvania athletic commission allowed him only \$5,000 for the bout. He was to have received \$10,000 for the 10 rounds, but under the commission's rule this was cut to the pro rata basis of the number of rounds he fought.

The commission withdrew from Godfrey the status as a heavy-weight contender, it having ruled some time ago that a heavy-weight world's champion would not be recognized in Pennsylvania until the giant negro had been eliminated by a battle in the ring.

British Suspend Constitution of Maltese Island

LONDON, June 24. (AP)—The British government has decided to suspend the Maltese constitution temporarily in view of a tense political situation in the island arising from a prolonged dispute with the Vatican.

Premier MacDonald announced the government's decision in the House of Commons. He said: "In view of the situation in Malta the government has decided with considerable reluctance that it has no alternative but to suspend temporarily suspension of the constitution."

EUGENE—Voters approved a one mile continuing levy for two years to provide \$25,000 for the improvement of the municipal airport.
