

CITY ELECTION ON AUGUST 12

Questions of Changing Charter and City Boundaries to Be Voted On.

Through a resolution and ordinance passed last night at the meeting of the city council, August 12 was set as the date for the special city election when citizens will employ their initiative and referendum powers.

One question will be that of changing the city charter for the purpose of obtaining a city manager form of government; the other is the matter of changing the municipal boundaries to include a number of present suburbs.

A copy of the form of charter to be voted on will soon be mailed from the police judge's office to every registered voter in the city.

Corporation Asks Leniency

A letter from the Pacific Han corporation in regard to the present sawdust nuisance was read and placed on file. It stated that a contract is now in the process of being awarded for installation of new boilers in the Klamath Heating company plant, which will do away with the sawdust nuisance. The corporation asked the city for leniency on the enforcement of the ordinance which prohibits the location of the fuel pile on Klamath avenue.

Resolution Presented

A resolution similar in character to one presented last week by the Central Labor Council, which was tabled, was received and placed on file. This latter one was drawn up following an explanation from Mayor T. H. Waters at the labor council meeting Wednesday night on the proposed franchise with the California Oregon Power company.

The labor council still advocates municipal ownership of the power plants but expressed willingness to co-operate with the city in collecting a franchise tax.

Sewer Unit Bids

Two bids were received on the 15th sewer unit: one from W. J. Tobin totaled \$54,938 and Dunn & Baker, \$42,977.50. They were referred to the council as a whole and city engineer.

Request Patching

A petition signed by 12 property holders of the Shippington Improvement club requested that sections of Oregon and Nevada avenues which are now in poor condition be patched. The mayor stated that the city plans to spend a great deal of money on improving those street sections as soon as the city's patching equipment arrives.

Ask Bus Service

Fifty property holders presented a petition requesting the Klamath Bus company to extend service to Oregon avenue. The street committee was instructed to take the matter up with the bus company.

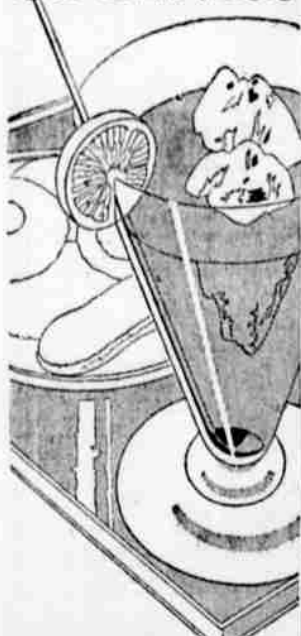
Bid Awarded

An ordinance was passed to second reading awarding the airport hangar contract to W. D. Miller Construction company.

Bids Present

T. W. Delsol was present at the meeting, representing the

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California-Oregon Power company, and stated work on the Shippington water mains and power lines is going forward as rapidly as possible. He said there is now some material here and more has been ordered. Work will probably be actively under way in a week or ten days.

Date Fixed

A resolution was adopted fixing the date of July 14 as the date for hearing objections on the assessment roll for the 14th sewer unit.

To Use Streets

A representative of the labor unions asked that permission be granted to use the streets during the Labor Day celebration. The council agreed to the plan but asked the union members to conform to the same conditions recommended to the Elks and American Legion for the '49 celebration.

Paving Ordinance

Since there were no objections to the proposal to improve Manzanita, Fremont and Leroy streets, the improvement ordinance was passed to second reading.

To Use Structure

Upon a recommendation from Councilman Van Camp, chairman of the fire committee, it was voted to notify the man who is building the structure on Main street for Apostolic Faith services, that the building may be occupied for 90 days, but after that date must be torn down, since it does not conform to the building code.

Eight building permits, totaling \$7550, were granted.
