

First Annual Trapshoot Opens Tomorrow

STATE EVENT DRAWING MANY LEADING SHOTS

Valuable Trophies and Cash Prizes Posted by Local Club.

The first annual trap shooting tournament to be sponsored by the Klamath Gun Club, will open Thursday morning at 9 o'clock. The gun club grounds are four miles north of Klamath Falls on the Dalles-California highway.

The tournament is to last four days, June 26, 27, 28, and 29, and will close with the spectacular last half of the Pacific Coast championship.

In addition to the \$200 in trophies, \$1000 in additional money will be offered to the winners of the various events.

Hundreds to shoot. Hundreds of trap shooters will be here from Oregon, Washington, California and Utah in addition to the many local fans who practice each Sunday at the grounds and many of whom have become skilled in shooting.

The officers of the local gun club, R. E. Dewese, president; E. N. Harndenbrook, vice-president; and H. E. Hauger, secretary-treasurer, will be in charge of the event.

The Amateur Trapshooting Association rules will govern the shoot and the scores will be included in the official records.

Events Open To All. Everyone interested in trapshooting, women as well as men, in the county, is invited to participate in the various events.

Regarding the trophies, the contestants shooting for targets only are eligible for all the trophies. Ties on all single target events will be shot off at 25 targets per man. Ties on double events will be shot off at 10 pair.

A contestant tied in any event forfeits all rights by being absent from the grounds.

Tournament Rules. Rules for the tournament are given below:

The Klamath Gun Club reserves the right to reject any entry.

The management reserves authority, if necessary, to postpone or eliminate any portion of the program on account of bad weather or other important reasons.

Luncheon of excellent quality and variety will be served daily at the grounds at reasonable prices.

Shooting will commence promptly at 9 o'clock each morning.

The revised rules of the A. T. A. will govern all points not otherwise provided for.

Targets will be thrown about fifty yards, and as nearly regulation as conditions will permit.

There will be a practice trap installed for your convenience.

Standard factory loaded shells will be on sale at the grounds.

NEVER LET A GROUND BALL PLAY YOU —

PLAY THE BALL BY GOING FORWARD AND PICKING A GOOD HOP. NEVER BACK UP ON A GROUND BALL IF POSSIBLE.

The "fade away," "fall away" or "screw ball" are all names of the same ball originated by the great Christy Mathewson.

The ball is delivered at its best when thrown overhand. In this case the rotation, when thrown to a left-hand hitter by a right-hand pitcher, is away from the batter.

The ball is held and delivered with the same motion as a fast ball, except that just as the ball is released the wrist is turned to the left and the ball emerges between the second and third fingers with a snap that leaves the side of the second finger as the last point of contact. The ball rotates exactly opposite to an outcurve.

Mathewson only used it in pitching to left-handers and I would advise young pitchers to do the same. Of course a southpaw will find it effective against right-hand hitters.

It is only effective when thrown low and away from the batter. Being thrown with the same motion as a fast ball it is very baffling to a batter who is all set for a fast ball.

Don't expect to learn to throw the screw ball in a day or so. Like the knuckleball it takes a great deal of practice.

Fullerton Given Good Support in First Game at Home.

By The Associated Press. Portland did some hitting off Davis in the seventh inning of their game with San Francisco yesterday to break a tie and win, 5 to 3. Fullerton, added by good support from the team that lost six of seven games to the Oaks last week, kept the Seals well in hand.

Los Angeles, the only first division team to win yesterday, moved to within one game of the lead in the Pacific Coast league by taking the series opener from Seattle, 5 to 2. A triple, sacrifice, error and wild pitch all in the eleventh inning broke up a tight game in which the Angels got a total of only five hits off Kallio, while the Indians collected seven from Ballou and Yerkes.

Gould Has Wild Streak. Al Gould, Sacramento moundsman, in one costly wild streak, walked Bassler, Hollywood pinch hitter, with the bases loaded in the tenth inning, giving the Stars the game, 6 to 5. He had had the advantage up to then giving less hits than his mates got off Rhodes and Johns.

Although Oakland got four home runs, two by Lombardi, off Bert Cole of the Missions in their first meeting of the year, the Reds on the 12 hits they got off Jim Dwares squeezed in enough tallies to win, 5 to 4, in a fast game at San Francisco.

P.)—Joe (Old Folks) Wilmore, negro, after acting as second in Norman Ratzlaff's corner in his fight with Ray McQuillan last night, dropped to the ground just after leaving the auditorium. He was rushed to an emergency hospital but all efforts to revive him failed. He was 60 years old and at one time was Jack Dempsey's trainer. Wilmore came here from Los Angeles to settle an estate inherited from a deceased sister and while here acted as trainer for various fighters.

Rosenberg Bought By N. Y. Giants

NEW YORK, June 25. (A. P.)—The New York Giants today announced the purchase of Harry Rosenberg, star outfielder, from the Mission club of the Pacific coast league in a \$40,000 deal.

In confirming the transaction, Charles A. Stoneham, president of the Giants, said the Mission club would receive \$25,000 in cash and two players, to be delivered in the spring of 1931, each valued at \$7,500.

Rosenberg has been ordered to report to Manager John McGraw on July 10, when the Giants will be in Philadelphia.

Rosenberg has been playing sensational ball, recent averages showing him to be hitting close to the .400 mark.

Cleveland Indians Thrill Fans With Exhibitions of Ups and Downs of Baseball

The Cleveland Indians may or may not finish the pennant race in the money, but already they have had the satisfaction of thrilling their home fans with one of the year's most exciting exhibitions of the ups and downs of baseball and in doing it, they have shown ability to go up again later.

Cleveland, off to a bad start, put on a great winning streak during its recent home stand against the American league's eastern clubs and rose to the top of the standing.

Since they have dropped three more in a row to the Washington Senators and retired to fourth place, 3 1/2 games behind the New York Yankees.

After taking a double header Monday, Washington needed only five innings yesterday to trounce the Indians, 7 to 0. Rain cut the contest short.

Red Sox Split Pitch. The futile task of pitching for the Boston Red Sox received an exhibition in the remaining American League double header. Red Sox were barely able to pull out the first game, 5 to 4, although he held the Detroit Tigers to five hits.

A pinch home run by Bill Sweeney finally decided the game. The Tigers made but six blows in the second contest but walks and errors gave them enough counters to gain an 8 to 7 decision after ten innings.

National Pitchers Score. The National league produced three good pitchers and they won three games.

"Wild Bill" Hallahan of St. Louis belted his name by allowing the Boston Braves only one walk as the Cardinals pounded out an 11 to 3 triumph.

He pitched about half after the first inning, in which Walter Berger hit his 32nd home run of the year to tie the Hack Wilson for the National league lead.

Cards Make 16 Hits. The Cards made 16 hits for 20 bases, including a pair of homers by George Watkins.

Pat Malone performed an even more effective feat as the Chicago Cubs moved to a place only two games behind the idle Brooklyn Dodgers with a 6 to 1 victory over Philadelphia.

Like Hallahan he struck out six but he gave the Phils only eight hits while the St. Louisian allowed eleven.

The Cubs had two big innings of three runs each and half their total was given them by three Philie errors.

Larry Henton also was hit rather freely, but he would not give his old mates, the New York Giants, a free trip to first and the Cincinnati Reds pulled out the game, 4 to 1, although out hit 11 to 9.
