CHICAGO, June 27. (AP).—"Chuck" Klein of the slugger but erratic Phillies is the first major league player to hang up 100 hits in the 1930 campaign. Klein got three hits for his 100 yesterday in a losing double-header with Pittsburgh while Terry of the Giants fell short by one when he got only one blow in a winning game against St. Louis. Hodapp of Cleveland has the most hits in the American league with 96 yet neither he nor Klein lead their leagues in hitting.

## ANGELS SHARE TOP POSITION WITH SOLONS

### Sacramento Goes Into Slump While Angels Have Good Luck.

After more than six weeks' solitary sojourn in first position in the Pacific Coast league, Sacramento found its leadership today shared by Los Angeles, which downed Seattle yesterday, 5 to 2, to rise to a tie for first place with the Senators, who were beaten by Hollywood, 13 to 2.

A sudden slump brought the Stars three straight losses to the Stars, a six-hit pitching job by Shellenback and three Hollywood homers ruining Bryan, Sacramento hurler, yesterday.

The Angels dealt a blow to veteran "Dutch" Ruether, as Baecht turned in another stellar hurling exhibition, shutting the Indians out in all except the eighth inning.

San Francisco and Oakland remained much in the running, both winning yesterday to be tied for second place two games behind the leaders, and it's anybody's race yet among the first four clubs.

The Seals pounded three Portland pitchers for an easy victory, 13 to 2. Miljus holding the Ducks to seven scattered hits, and Crosetti figuring in all of the three San Francisco double plays.

Seven errors committed by the Missions added to seven innings of shut-out ball pitched by McElroy gave the Oaks an 8 to 5 victory. Rosenberger's homer in the sixth led a two-inning red attack which failed to stem the Oakland lead.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27. (AP).—The largest array of tennis talent ever entered in Oregon State meet will start play Saturday morning on the Irving courts with national champions and national ranking players battling for the Oregon crown.

Among the outsiders entered in the men's singles are the Burton brothers, Carl and Don of San Diego; Ray Casey, who won the title three year ago; Brad Harrison, University of Oregon star; Ross Hagging of Victoria; Irving Weinstein, fourth country ranking player in the country some years ago; Joe Coughlin, San Francisco Lieutenant Commander J. C. Edwards, Victoria; Jack Cosgrove, Pacific Coast junior champion and Frank Gobe.

In the women's singles Gilda Meyer Gross and Charlotte Miller, both Berkeley, are favorites. Miss Miller is the national girls champion.

Kerth Berhat, professional at the Irvington club, will not defend his title.
