

BLAST SINKS RIVER BOAT

the eastern fringe of the Thousand Island group yesterday when the explosion occurred.

Several holes had been drilled in the rock and filled with dynamite and the day crew was drilling additional holes to place more dynamite when an electrical storm broke over the river about 4:30 p. m. Many of the night shift were asleep below the decks. Witnesses said they saw a flash of lightning dart down to the boat, followed immediately by a terrific explosion. The air was filled with debris and the drill boat had disappeared.

Some reports were that there had been a large quantity of dynamite aboard the craft which had been exploded by the flash. Luther Kuckenbocker, superintendent in charge of the work, who was ashore at the time said there was no dynamite aboard the boat.

He said the explosion was caused by lightning following the steel drills which were working in the rock or wires leading to charges which had been placed.

Leo Marion, an inspector of the public works department at Olatava, who was one of those rescued, estimated there were three tons of dynamite in the drill holes and expressed the opinion that there also was a considerable quantity in the boat. He charged that an unidentified boat passed at the time of the explosion, but did not bring to aid in the rescue.

U. S. Cutter Sea Blast. The explosion was witnessed by the crew of U. S. coastguard cutter 211, which was passing in charge of Captain G. H. Lok, with M. R. Haasmussen, chief inspector of the Buffalo district.

The cutter hastily made for the spot and lowered a life boat. A number of men were seen clinging to wreckage and while those near at hand were hauled aboard the cutter, the life boat picked up others. After landing 12 survivors, the cutter returned to the scene and searched for others.
